

# Strange Story Told

## Flying Saucer From Other Planet

Los Angeles, March 10—A Los Angeles business man, Mr. Ray Dimmick, told reporters here that last week he saw an ultra-streamlined flying saucer which had been wrecked on a mountain side in Mexico. Then, he added, he had been told that a man, 23in tall had died in the crash and that the body had been embalmed for scientific study and that high Mexican officials believed the machine came from some other planet.

According to Dimmick, the craft crashed about three months ago. "The saucer was powered by two motors," he added. "It was about 46ft. in diameter and built of a strange material resembling aluminium."

There is no confirmation of the report, but Dimmick said: "I am big enough to take the consequences of what I have said and stand my ground."

### ALTERS STORY

Associated Press, however, says Dimmick later changed his story. He said he saw only a strip of metal which a business associate told him came from a space ship. Dimmick added that his business associates described the craft as 46ft. in diameter and built of a metal resembling aluminium, but much harder and powered by two motors.

Dimmick said he would furnish the names of his business associates if "requested by the proper authorities."

### NO BASIS FOR REPORTS

According to Reuter's Mexico City correspondent, the Mexican Government put an end to the flying saucers scare by announcing that there was no "real basis for reports that saucers had been flying over Mexico."

Flying saucers had been reported over Chihuahua airport and also Durango City. It alleged that the flying saucer over Durango was reported to have remained for two hours. The version of those who claimed to have seen it all differed. An officer who reported a flying saucer over Chihuahua airport now said he believed what he saw was the star Venus.

Slight damage was caused by a fire at Brenton Bros.' bakery, Chapple Street, last night. The Central Fire Brigade was called at 9.36 o'clock to a fire in some wood in the bakehouse.

The minor blaze was extinguished by the use of buckets of water and chemical extinguishers.
