

WAS SCARED BY FLYING SAUCER

ST. MARY'S, (Pennsylvania), March 16: A flying saucer today crash-landed in the headlines again when a respectable 47-years-old Doctor of Science gave the first detailed description of one.

Dr. Craig Hunter, technical director of a Washington medical instrument supply firm, said he was driving along the road between Penfield and Clearfield when he saw an object in the air.

"It was a dirty metallic colour between 50 and 150 feet in diameter and about 25 feet thick at the centre," he said.

It was travelling at an altitude of between 250 and 500

feet, trailing a streamer about 200 feet long.

"I watched the disc for about two minutes.

"It seemed to be built in three concentric circular portions.

"The outer portion, about ten feet wide, had slits in it and

feet wide, had slits in it and immediately in from the leading edge were two apertures.

"The second ring seemed to be the only part of the thing which was spinning. It was rotating with a great hissing whistle.

"The inner and largest part of the disc did not seem to be spinning.

"The whole object was travelling through the air at about

60 to 70 miles an hour."

Dr. Hunter said he saw the saucer at 6.15 p.m. Sunset was at 6.22 p.m. He said that the evening was clear.

He added that the saucer moved away from him into the setting sun.

"I was frightened," he said, "but not as frightened as a truckdriver who pulled up beside my car when he saw the saucer.

"He said only. 'My God!' jumped into his truck and roared off.

"I have done a little private flying and I am sure that the object was no aeroplane."
