

Impresses Eleanor

NEW YORK, Mar. 27.—
Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt to-day
said she was impressed by the
report of a "Flying Saucer"
from two veteran airline pilots.

She interviewed Captain Jack Adams and First Officer G. Anderson on her weekly television programme.

They had caused a stir by declaring they had sighted "strange circular craft with blinking lights" speeding over Arkansas on the night of March 20. Mrs. Roosevelt said she had thought people who reported flying saucers were "seeing things" until she heard the pilots' story.

She described it as "evidence we have not heard before—from qualified people."

Mrs. Roosevelt asked Adams whether he thought people were aboard the saucer: "I don't know, but I am positive it was a controlled flight," he replied.

WEIRD CRAFT

A scale model of a weird craft fitting the pilot's description has been televised. It was shaped like a Chinese coolie's hat, with one large light at its pointed top. Other lights were spaced around the brim.

A veteran private pilot reported he saw a flying saucer within 25 miles of Washington to-day.

Mr. Bertram Totten, a clerk at the Congressional Library, said he was flying at 5000 feet when he sighted an aluminium coloured saucer 40 feet wide and ten feet thick. It was whirling along at 1000 feet below his plane.

Mr. Totten said: "I dived toward it, but before I could get very close it zoomed up into space at several hundred miles an hour."
