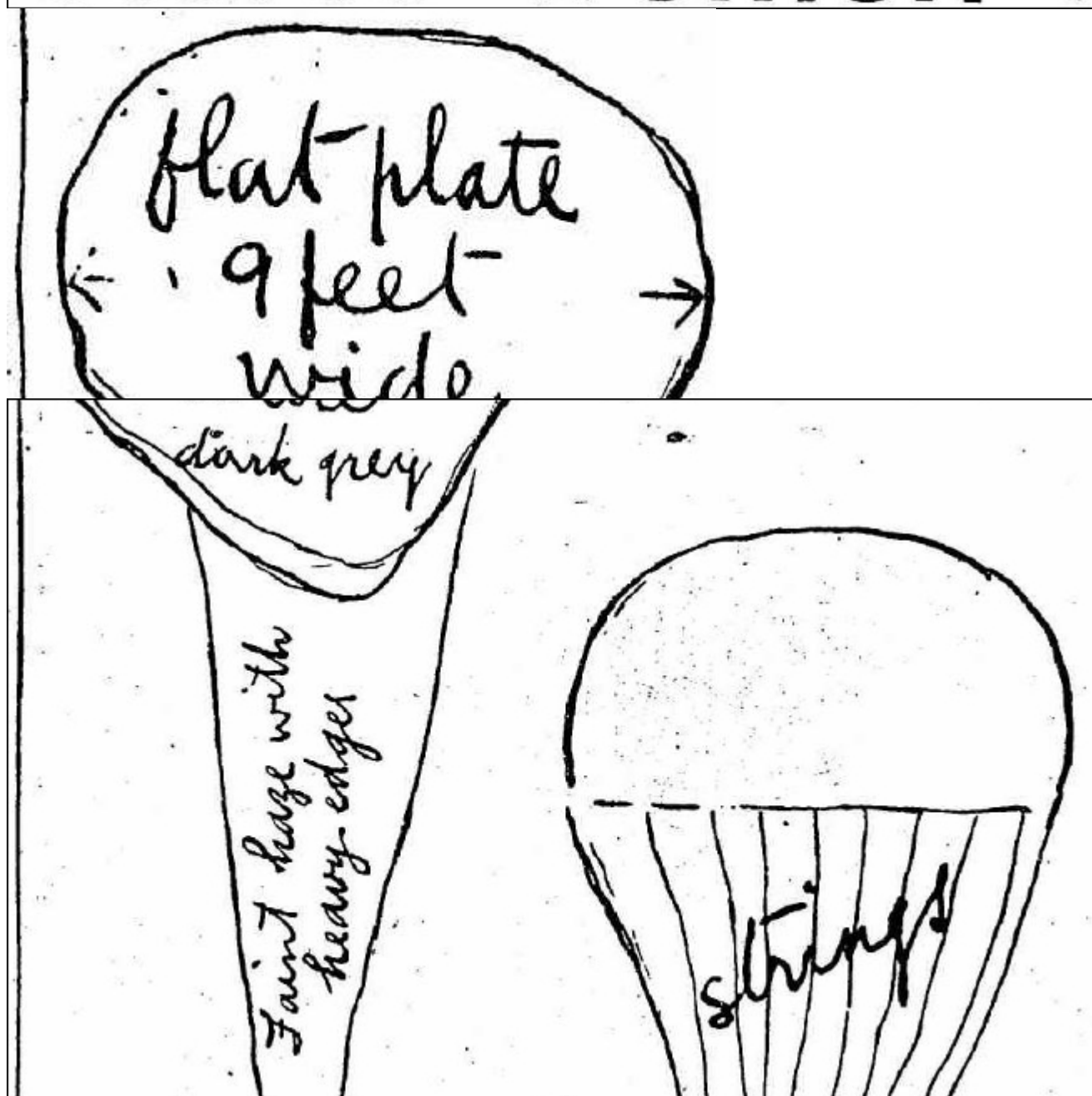
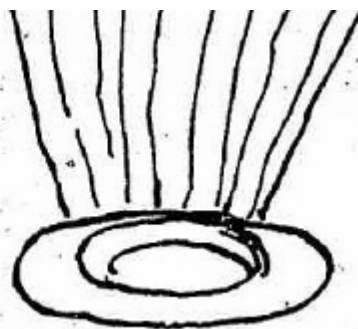
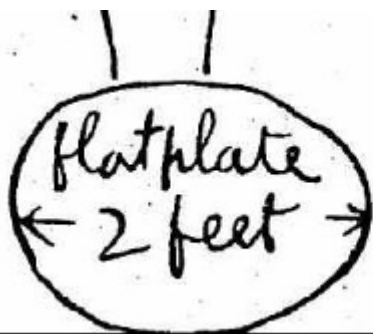


THEY CALL THESE FLYING SAUCERS
