

30,000 see flying saucer

More than 30,000 people saw a flying saucer over Sydney last night.

About 3000 soldiers, ready for action, were nearby when the saucer appeared over the Showground.

But the Army was not worried.

The saucer was part of the brilliant fireworks display at Eastern Command's 1952 Army Tattoo.

The Tattoo kept the crowd thrilled and interested for 2½ hours.

It consisted of fireworks, buffoonery, pageantry, fantasy, noise, martial music,

marching, and modern military manoeuvres.

The programme began with a tableau depicting Elizabeth I reviewing her troops at Tilbury in 1588.

It closed with a colorful pageant of British history from Elizabeth I to the

from Elizabeth I to the present Queen.

The crowd applauded a drill and arms display by men of the 13th National Service Training Battalion, and to Army gymnasts from the 19th Training Battalion.
