

When you see a flying saucer . . .

If you should see a "flying saucer," or even something like one, you should immediately notify the Australian Flying Saucer Investigation Committee.

The committee was set up in Melbourne last weekend.

Its organisers emphasise that they have "no political, military, or official affiliation."

They include four members of the Astronomical Society of Victoria and one woman.

Mr. D. K. Thomson, chairman, a former R.A.A.F. pilot, said last night: "We're attempting to approach flying saucer reports with intelligent curiosity.

"We have no preconceptions whatsoever.

"So far I haven't seen a flying saucer, or anything like one."

Mr. Thomson said that each report would receive "careful and impartial" con-

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"Significant sightings"

would be referred to experts in physics, aeronautics, meteorology, and other sciences.

Mr. Thomson appealed to persons seeing unexplained lights or objects in the sky to forward a description, with details of time and place, to Mr. L. T. Whitney, honorary secretary, Australian Flying Saucer Investigation Committee, G.P.O. Box 5278, Melbourne.
