

Author 'met inmate of flying saucer'

LONDON, Monday: George Adamski has not only seen a flying saucer, but has met a man from one which swoops down to earth from the planet Venus.

So he says in a book just published.

Adamski is co-author of the recently published book "Flying Saucers Have Landed."

Mr. Adamski lives near the famous observatory on Mount Palomar in California, but he follows his scientific hobbies from his own back garden.

Several times, he relates, he has journeyed into the desert to investigate reports of saucers, and for six years found nothing.

But on November 20, 1952, "I first made personal contact with a man from another world. He came to earth in his space craft, a flying saucer. He called it a scout ship."

The place of the meeting he explains, was on the Californian desert 10 miles from Parker, Arizona.

A mother ship — cigar-shaped silvery and gigantic—came first into view but vanished when American planes flew over

Adamski and six companions—whose names he gives—waited and watched.

"Not long afterwards," he narrates, "there was a brilliant flash and a beautiful small craft appeared to be drifting between two mountain peaks and settling half a mile away

"Then a man with long hair appeared and beckoned—I was in the presence of a man from another world

"The beauty of his form surpassed anything I have ever seen. He looked about 5 ft. 6 in. and 28 years old.

"His forehead was large; his eyes grey-green and slightly aslant. His cheekbones were high.

"He had a face as hairless and beautiful as a

child's. His sandy, long hair hung shoulder-length in waves, glistening more beautifully than any woman's."

There was the language problem, of course, says Adamski, but he got over that by gesturing and telepathy, and so learnt that the handsome stranger had come from Venus.

Another thing he learnt was that the Venusians had come to Earth to study its radiation, because atom bombs were affecting the outer spaces.

Fear violence

Adamski said he found out that people like human beings live on other planets; they visit the earth, but not populated areas because they fear violence.

Their flying saucers are operated by attraction and repulsion. They are spaceships that come from a mother ship.

Adamski was not allowed to peer inside the flying saucer and the Venusian was so modest that he

was so modest that he barred having his photograph taken.

But he did take from Adamski earlier a film he had exposed, and, adds Adamski promised to return it

Sure enough, it came back 23 days later — the picture had been replaced by a strange photograph and a symbolic undecipherable message.

Adamski's story and the photograph he took of the craft that delivered his film are still being vetted by scientists.

Adamski reports that they have listened to the tale without expressing any doubt.

And so far they have not yet publicly announced that they believe in Venusians — or the flying saucers, for that matter.
