

# R.A.A.F. INVESTIGATING 'FLYING SAUCER' REPORTS

**MELBOURNE. — Human beings did not know whether the world was the only planet with life on it, an R.A.A.F. spokesman said.**

**"We don't know if there are better brains in the universe than ours," he said.**

**"We should be flying into space ourselves within 50 years."**

The spokesman appealed to all people who were sure they had seen an unidentifiable object in the sky to report to the R.A.A.F.

"Investigations take time and money, so we don't want reports from people who have only thought they have seen something," he said.

The statement was the first made officially by the R.A.A.F. that it is investigating "flying saucer" reports. The investigations have been going on since 1947.

The officer said that the Air Force was taking "flying saucer" reports in Australia seriously.

"We are anxious to get to the bottom of the reports," he said.

"We have an open mind, but who are we to say the public is just seeing things.

"Our investigations show that 10 per cent of the people reporting to us have definitely seen something. In addition, many of the reports correspond.

#### **PILOTS' REPORTS**

"Many of the people making the reports should know what they are talking about, especially pilots."

The R.A.A.F. does not publish the reports so that people may be prevented from making faked sightings, and so that a true and accurate check can be made on similar observations.
