

# MORE 'FLYING SAUCERS' THIS TIME — 3 OF THEM

Malvern's "Flying Saucer" reappeared on Saturday night and at least four people claimed last night to have seen it.

Two people described

the phenomenon as "luminous and like a football."

They said they saw three of them.

One man gave a new description — he likened it to "a halo."

The only woman known to have seen "the thing" suffers from a heart complaint.

She suffered shock when two men who had been watching it stepped suddenly from the shadows to point it out to her.

She was too ill to be interviewed.

Mr. Ronald Hyams, of Grosvenor st., St. Kilda, and Mr. Roy Oaks, of College st., Elsternwick were the first to report the

object. They were the first to report the strange object.

They had spent the evening with friends in Malvern.

"The only alcohol we had during the evening was one bottle of beer, which we shared. Our friends all drank tea," they said.

About 20 minutes after midnight they were walking along Claremont avenue, Malvern, when Mr. Hyams caught sight of the "saucer."

"When I first saw it in the sky it appeared to have no definite shape, but, as I watched it, I thought it looked like a football, slightly flattened on the under side," he said.

"It seemed to be travelling from the south towards Carnegie. It was at about the height that mail planes pass over and travelling comparatively slowly. . . Then it veered to the east at a greater speed and disappeared from sight.

"While we were watching it a couple approached

ing it a couple approached and we drew their attention to it. A couple of minutes later, two more appeared from the south, veered east, and disappeared in the same direction as the first one.

"There was no noise. They certainly appeared to be moving under some form of control. We could not see anything like people in it. It was quite

luminous, with a whitish sort of light surrounding it."

Mr. Oaks, corroborated his friend's story. "I have always been sceptical about this kind of experience," he said, "but what we saw on Saturday night is consistent with the reports of other people who have had a similar experience.

"It was certainly much bigger than any Skymaster or any aircraft."

Mr. E. M. Tipper, of Claremont avenue, Malvern, was walking home with his wife from a card evening at St. Kilda when Mr. Hyams and Mr. Oaks stopped them and pointed to the "flying football."

"We saw them all right — all three of them," said Mr. Tipper. "It was not imagination on our part, and, just for the record, all
