# **MYSTERIOUS LIGHTS OVER SYDNEY 3 TIMES IN WEEK**

**SYDNEY, Friday.**

For the third time this week mysterious violet, orange, blue and red lights were reported over Sydney last night.

The sightings were mainly reported from the seafront area, but the night watch at South Head Signal Station did not see them.

Investigators are trying to link the latest reports from Sydney with the earlier ones of strange luminous objects in the sky.

One report described red and blue flames shooting from behind a "terrific white light," which appeared from the sea near Coogee and disappeared south.

Taxidriver John Barker, of Coogee, said, "I never believed stories of flying saucers before. But what I saw has changed my mind."

Barker said the white "light"

Barker said the white "light" swung in from the sea at 1.30 am and turned south along the coast.

Red and blue flames streamed behind as it disappeared.

Officials are seeking to link Barker's story and reports that colored lights were seen near the Heads, with earlier accounts that strange objects had been seen in the sky in the Botany Bay-Merimboune area.

Mr. E. Tate, of Girraween, said he had seen a violet-colored "glow" hovering at 6.55 pm.

Miss Mary Giuliano, of Bellevue Hill, described a bright orange glow moving slowly south at 7.10 pm.

South Head signal station night watch did not see these lights.

Reports have reached the "Sydney Sun" in the past two days of objects which appeared to be "flying railway carriages" and a "flying single-decker bus."

Miss Yvonne Beaumont, of Berowra, reported seeing a "strange object" over Berowra at 8.10 pm on Tuesday.

"It looked like a short railway carriage," she said.

"You could hardly look at it for the blinding lights.

"My mother and father and I saw it from the front verandah.

"We rushed out when we heard a terrific, frightening noise—like an aeroplane in a dive.

"It could not have been more than 100ft up. It headed straight for the sea.

"We watched it for two minutes until it seemed about 20 miles away.

'It had reddish-white flashing lights,' Miss Beaumont said.
