"FLYING SAUCERS". Mr. Ken Wallace, building contractor, of West Wyalong, informs me that at 10 a.m. on Sunday last he saw in the sky about 20,000 feet above Wyalong what appeared to be two "Flying saucers" conjoined. The object was bright silver in color, and was travelling at an angle of 45 degrees.

Ken, by the way, served in the Royal Australian Navy for nine years, and was one of the 220 survivors of a crew of 600 of the cruiser Perth when it was sunk by the Japs in 1942.

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TREES AT UNGARIE. Members of the Ungarie Progress Association are steadily pursuing an ambitious policy of tree planting at Ungarie. Recently representatives of the Association paid a visit to Griffith and selected 100 young kurajong trees. These have all been planted in Ethel and Ungarie Streets.
