'... Here's my proof' (But where's the Martian?)

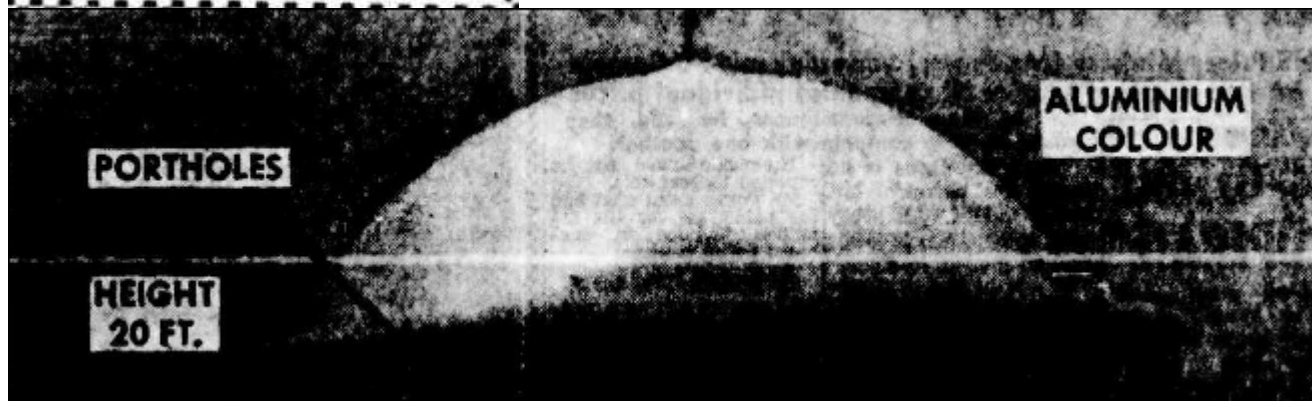
Cedric Allingham's book —"Flying Saucers from Mars—the Facts"—was published in London this week.

He claimed to have met, photographed, and interviewed the Martian (by signs).

Allingham described how, when the "saucer" landed "with a soft thud," a sliding panel moved back, and a man

leaped lightly and gracefully to the ground. He and Allingham raised their right arms in salute.

Allingham was at first certain the man had come from Venus, but when they got to a sign language conversation, Allingham made a rough sketch of the solar system, and the spaceman indicated Mars as his home.
