Men don't ride in saucers but—he says—they've landed

If you take your flying saucers with a pinch of salt, then you should hear Robert C. Gardner of San Francisco.

Mr. Gardner is this season's lecturer on the subject that last year set Vancouver on its ear with the appearance of Daniel Fry — the man says he who rode in one.

MR. GARDNER doesn't believe that anyone of this earth has flown in an interplanetary ship.

"I think some people may have a psychological experience which they mistook for a physical experience," he said. "And there could be some who are simulating an actual experience."

But does Mr. Gardner believe in flying saucers?

"MOST DEFINITELY," he said Tuesday night, "I wouldn't chase the figments of other people's imagination for eight years, which is just how long

I've been investigating this phenomena."

He will tell his story with movies and flying models today through Saturday at the Hotel Vancouver.

He believes little men have landed on earth from extra-terrestrial space ships. There's plenty of evidence to prove it, he says.
