

# MORE MYSTERY CRATERS FOUND

**LONDON, Thursday (A.A.P.-Reuter).**  
— British Army bomb disposal units are investigating two more mystery craters, this time in Scotland.

Army sappers already are trying to find the cause of a crater in a potato field in Dorset, Southern England, which has given rise to theories of a "flying saucer" visit.

The Scottish craters were found on a hillside near Middle Monynut Farm, about 21 miles south of Dunbar, in East Lothian.

They are irregular in shape, with a mean diameter of about 16ft. and a depth of two or three feet.

They are 12ft. apart and 12 channels, varying in length up to 44ft., radiate from them.

## **Normal Job**

The channels vary in width

The channels vary in width and depth to a maximum of one foot.

Pieces of turf up to three feet wide are scattered up to 40 yards from the craters.

About 35ft. from the craters are a series of square holes, measuring one foot

wide and two feet deep.

The Dorset job is near Charlton, in the Shaftsbury district.

An Army spokesman said at Salisbury yesterday that a bomb disposal unit was treating the matter as a normal job.

Scientists at bomb disposal headquarters at Horsham, Sussex, are examining carbon deposits found in the crater.

Mr. Roy Mason, Labour M.P., will ask the Air Minister, Mr. Hugh Fowler, today for an examination of the crater and other evidence at Charlton "to assess the possibility of its having been made by an unidentified flying object."

On Friday, Mr. Patrick Wall, Conservative M.P.

Wall, a Conservative M.P., will ask the War Minister, Mr. Joseph Godber, what evidence there is "as to whether this crater was made from an extra-terrestrial source."

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
