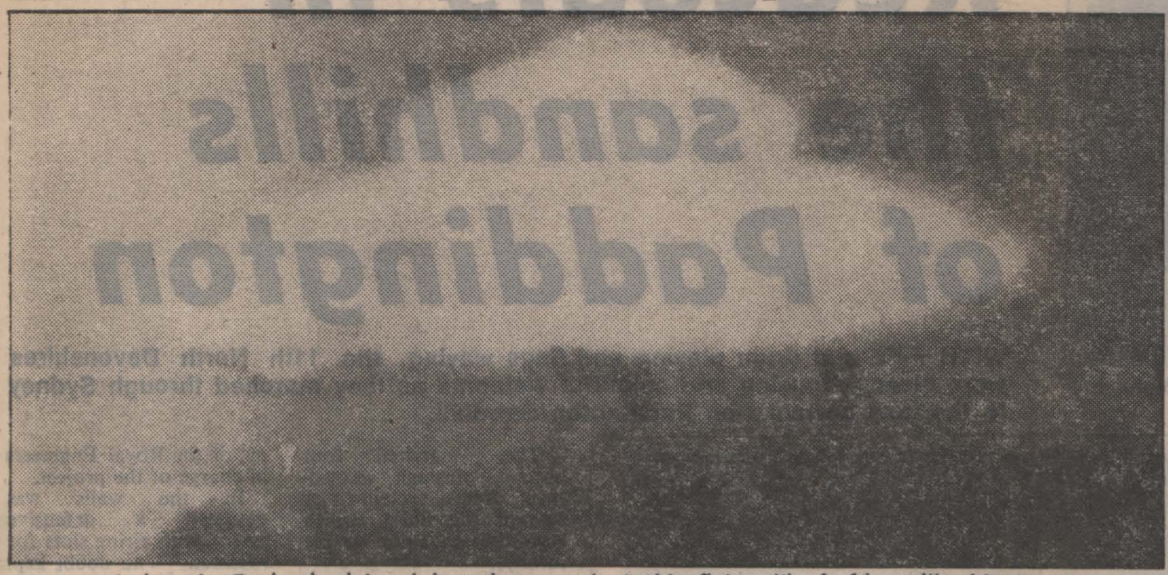


The lost army of Gallipoli

HOW DID a complete British regiment, the First/Fourth Norfolk, disappear on August 28, 1915, during the Gallipoli Campaign?

August 28 was a beautiful, clear day, but it was noticed that six or eight "loaf-of-bread" clouds were hovering over Hill 60 near Suvla Bay.

The clouds, despite a strong breeze, did not move.

The regiment of several hundred men was seen marching up a sunken road towards Hill 60.

The regiment marched into the cloud — one of the clouds hovering over the road — but did not come out.

SOUND LIKE fiction? Well, it's not. It's fact, according to author Brinsley le Poer Trench, in his compelling new book, "The Eternal Subject" (Souvenir Press, \$6.80) about UFOs — unidentified flying objects.

The author, who is international chairman of the Worldwide UFO Movement, contends that such happenings are part of "teleportation" — part of the paraphernalia of the age-old phenomenon of the UFO.

Mystery

Quoting from a clutch of newspaper and magazine clippings, the author asserts that intelligent beings from another universe may well have established bases on our planet.

He writes: "The First/Fourth Norfolk was posted as 'missing', or wiped out, and when Turkey surrendered in 1918 the first thing Britain demanded was the return of this regiment.

"Turkey replied that she had neither captured nor made contact with the regiment, and did not know it existed.

"This is one of the most remarkable and unexplained mysteries of modern times.

"Was a whole British regiment taken up by a huge UFO?"

"If so, this must have been one of the cases where those taken up in a cloud UFO have not returned."

Blackout

The author's "evidence" reads as if it comes from the pages of science-fiction.

Apart from the "lost" regiment, he cites numerous other examples of people (usually couples) coming into contact with strange beings...

He tells of a South American couple travelling on their honeymoon in 1968 on a motoring trip in the Brazilian State of Rio Grande Do Sul.

Suddenly they felt drowsy, then a mysterious "white cloud"

emerged and then they remembered no more.

Later they regained consciousness and found they were in Mexico.

Mr le Poer Trench quotes a similar case of Marcilo Ferraz, a Brazilian businessman, who was driving with his wife on a lonely road near Sao Paulo.

Again the drowsiness, then the "white cloud," and blackout — until they also woke up in Mexico.

Such modern-day happenings, the author contends, are remarkably similar to the case in 1593 when one Spanish soldier, attached to a regiment in far-way Manila, suddenly turned up in Mexico City.

The soldier said that he had no idea how he had travelled the 9,000 miles, but he knew that the Governor of the Philippines had just been murdered.

He described the incident and detailed the exact time and date on which it had happened.

The poor soldier was immediately thrown into the brig, and there he lingered for the long, slow weeks that it takes a galleon to travel from Manila to Acapulco, and the time it takes a messenger to run across the Great Sierras to Mexico City.

Sure enough, Mr le Poer Trench claims, the word came, the Governor was dead — murdered on the very day the soldier arrived in Mexico City.

Such happenings, claims Mr le Poer Trench, are common phenomena — much more common, he alleges, than the world's "authorities" would have us believe.

In fact, Mr le Poer Trench, in his immensely readable 200-page book, claims there is an international government-to-government conspiracy to "hush-up" UFO sightings.

He contends that the US

Government has tried to actively discourage speculation about UFOs.

Mr Le Poer Trench admits that there seems some link between UFOs and the psychic.

It seems that those who actively believe in the existence of UFOs are almost always the ones who come into contact with such extra-terrestrial beings.

But not so, he says, for those who sight UFOs.

His book is littered with photographs, drawings, slides and maps of what are claimed to be "actual unidentified flying objects."

He has also documented scores of cases of sightings, landings and observations by pilots, policemen, soldiers and others.

'Doughnut'

Yet perhaps his most startling conclusion is that our universe may well contain "worm-holes," or entrances, into other universes.

Such a theory, the author relates, was first suggested by Professor John Wheeler, a professor of physics at Princeton and a co-inventor of the nuclear bomb.

Mr Le Poer Trench argues that our universe may be like a giant "doughnut," with all stars and galaxies on the solid surface of the doughnut, and the hole in the centre an area of "superspace."

In such an area, space and time would not exist, and therefore journeys from one galaxy to another would be instantaneous.

Taking his remarkable theories a step further, the author contends that UFOs could well emerge from "worm-holes" in the galaxy to visit our planet.

This has happened increasingly in recent years, he contends, and now time is starting to run out.

He claims the "eternal subject" of UFOs cannot be concealed any longer.

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
