

LATE - NIGHT U.F.O. SEEN ON MONDAY

At the height of the thunderstorm, late on Monday night a number of people saw an unidentified light low in the western sky.

The object was bright despite the heavily clouded sky.

It was first reported by Mr. Cyril Yeates who saw it while driving home shortly before 11 p.m. after acting as a projectionist for a film evening.

Mr. Neville Hardy, the local representative of the Australasian Flying Saucer Research Society was informed and drove first out on the Lincoln Highway by which time however the object had dropped below the level of the hills.

From a position south of the City however he saw the object travel towards Sleaford.

"It was very low and may have landed in the Sleaford area," he said.

"The object was obviously fairly close as when the lightning illuminated the sky, the storm clouds were lit up behind it," Mr. Hardy said.

While being observed from north of the city the object faded for a few seconds and then again appeared brightly.

Mr. David Hall, approaching the port in his cray boat Charles Frances, is also reported to have seen the object.
