

UFO sighted

SOME people might be sceptical about Unidentified Flying Objects — but not Tumby Bay's Daphne Hindle.

While Mrs Hindle, 79, was scared people would not believe her story, she is adamant she saw a UFO outside her Tumby Bay unit on the foreshore.

She woke shortly after 3 am on February 9 to see a round moving light outside her unit.

By the time she walked to her window it was coming over the sand dunes near Salt Creek, strobing as it landed on the sand or in the water.

Mrs Hindle said the oval object appeared to be glowing on the inside and started to inflate at the top shooting up pillars of light into the night sky.

She said a large, square panel of lights was extended at the top of the object.

She said the UFO had to be generating its own power source because there was no electricity connected to that part of the beach.

Mrs Hindle said she watched it for about three minutes before it disappeared.

"My first impression was that it was in a hurry to land," she said.

"I have seen many things in my days that have been able to be explained, but not this.

"Some people are sceptical about these things — some people don't believe in them.

"Some people think that it does not exist but why

Mrs Hindle said while the experience was not frightening it was eerie.

"I can not get it out of my mind — I think about it all day, all night and when I wake up in the morning," she said.

"I have no idea what it was because there is no explanation for it."

She said some members of her family were contacting the Commonwealth Science and Industry Research Organisation (CSIRO).

She said while it was possible the UFO could have been a military vehicle, she said it was not a helicopter, aeroplane car or boat.
