'THEY HAD POINTED EARS, THE SHIP WAS SILVERY'

EARTH CALLING space ship. Some schoolchildren have drawn a pretty detailed picture of your flying visit to their school in West Wales last week.

From the tip of your toes to your pointed ears they've got you down in black and white.

The score of children at Broad Haven, Dyfed, who saw a mysterious, disc-shaped, silver object in a field 300 yards from their school, have sketched and written about what they saw.

Their sightings corresponded with that of a woman in the same village who reported several, bright lights in the sky and later, schoolchildren at Hubberston, Milford Haven, said they had seen a cigar-shaped object over the town.

The three sightings have convinced Mr. Randall Jones Pugh, South Wales co-ordinator for the

British Unidentified Flying Objects Research Association, that the Broad Haven children really did see a UFO.

Two 10-year-olds, David Ward and Shaun Garrison, were among the first to spot it.

David wrote down for his headmaster, "The ship was silvery, the pepul wer green, the pepul had sort

of carmers. (carmers . . . cameras) the ship was smaller than the ships we have, they had pointed ears."

Paul Williams wasn't sure about the ears: "We saw something come out of it. It had a pontid (pointed) helmet."

"We ran and told Sir and when we went back it was not there."


Shaun says, "It was flatish and had about 10 or 11 windows and a door with a runway leading from the door and it was silver and it was in a clump of trees."

David and Shaun then told others.

Phillip Rees reported, "Shaun and David came running in and said that there was something there. So me and some other boys went up to the top of the playing field."

"We saw something silver disced shape. There seemed to be a door opening from the object. David Davies and Tudor Jones saw a figure they said it was silver, I did not see the figure."

"The object had a dome on the top of it with a light. Tudor said he

heard a noise like something trying to take off. It was a very dull day but I did see something."

Their headmaster, Mr. Ralph Llewellyn, who interviewed each child separately and suggested they drew what they saw, agreed they

had seen something unusual.

"I don't believe that children of junior school age are capable of playing such a sophisticated prank," he said. "I believe they did see something that they do not normally see."
