## Bid to solve UFO mystery

THE mystery of Gwent's UFOs could be solved by the end of the month — through a computer.

Mrs Myfanwy Davies, an investigator for National UFO Laboratories, has spent the last three weeks visiting South Wales. Some thirty sightings have recently been reported in Gwent alone.

She was accompanied by

her assistant, Mrs Anne Norman, whose husband, John, drove. Together they covered more than 300 miles and talked to as many people as possible who claim to have seen unidentified lights in the sky.

The most prolific informant, Mr Frederick Jackson, of Dorset Cres-

cent, Newport, was interviewed on Sunday night.

Now all the information has been sent off for the laboratory computer in North Wales to try and unravel the mystery.

Mrs Davies plans to return to North Wales at the end of October, and Mrs Norman told us that they hoped to have the results by then.
