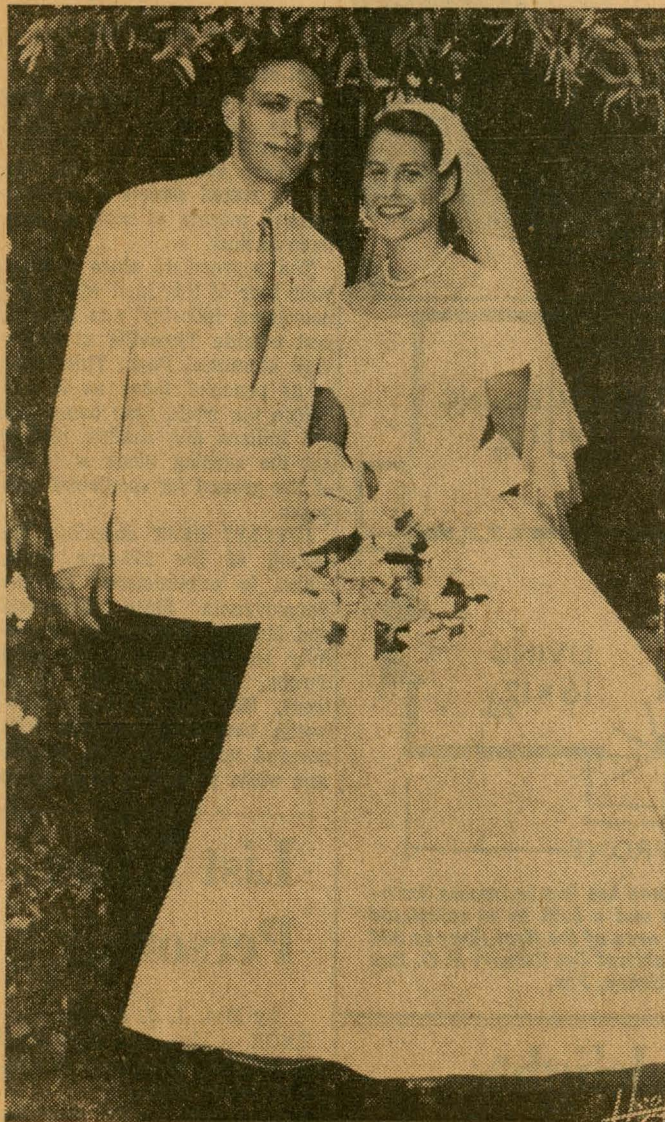


# Daughter Of Julius Stahls Is Wed In Impressive Garden Ceremony To Dr. John Mack Of New York City

The garden ceremony, performed by Rabbi Maurice Zigmond of the Harvard University Hillel Foundation, took place at 3 p. m. Sunday, July 12, at the home of the bridegroom's sister, Mrs. Sidney Ingbar of Auburndale, Mass. Mr. Stahl gave his daughter in marriage.

Mrs. Irving Stahl, sister-in-law of the bride, was honor attendant and Dr. Mack chose Dr. Sidney Ingbar to accompany him as best man. Irving M. Stahl, brother of the bride, ushered guests to their seats.

Upon graduating from Oil City High School in 1951, the former Miss Stahl was awarded a full scholarship to the University of Michigan, given by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. During her college years at the University she was elected president of the Inter-Dorm Judiciary Council of Alice Lloyd Hall. → *Erroneous!*

She received her bachelor of arts degree in psychology and master of arts in social work. At college she was chairman of the Women's Panel and a member of the Senior Society, a women's honorary society. She is now a social worker at the Beth Israel Hospital in Boston.

Dr. Mack, who recently completed his residency in psychiatry at the Massachusetts Mental Health Center, is a graduate of Oberlin College where he received his bachelor of arts degree in history, was elected to Phi Beta Kappa, and was a member of the tennis and soccer teams.

He graduated cum laude from Harvard Medical School where he was a member of the Alpha Omega Alpha, medical honorary society. Dr. Mack interned in medicine at the Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston.

Shortly after a western honeymoon the couple will leave for Japan where Dr. Mack, who has recently been commissioned a captain in the U. S. Fair Force, will be stationed at the Tachikawa Air Force Base Hospital for two years.
