Pulitzer Prize author lauded

The director of psychiatry at Cambridge Hospital was named an honorary citizen of the City of Cambridge yesterday for winning a Pulitzer Prize for excellence in biographical literature.

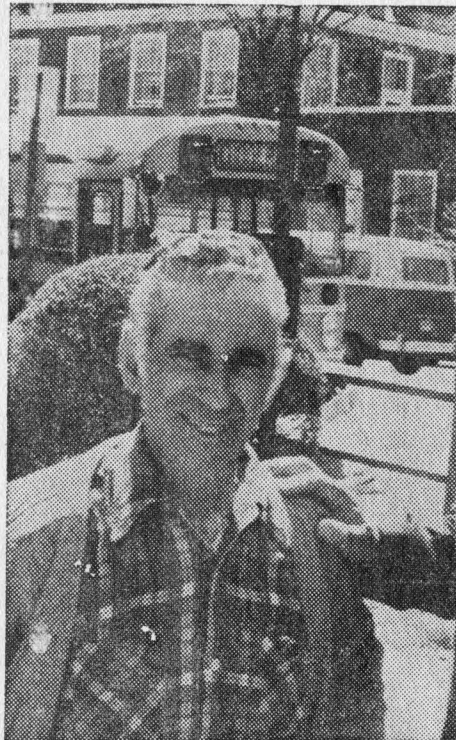
Dr. John Mack, who also is a professor of psychiatry at Harvard Medical School, was given the honor by Mayor Alfred E. Vellucci at City Hall.

Dr. Mack won the prize for his book, "A Prince of Our Disorder," on the life of Lawrence of Arabia. It was published last year.

The 47-year-old psychiatrist lives in Chestnut Hill.

In citing him and presenting him with a bronze plaque of the seal of the city, Vellucci said the book is a landmark work correlating the personal conflicts of T.E. Lawrence to the historical events and achievements of his time.

The mayor noted that in addition to being chief of psychiatry at the Cambridge Hospital, Dr. Mack also directs the education program at the Somerville Mental Health Center.
