In the fall of 1988, a Mexican national named Rafael Camarena began to cross the border

daily from Agua Prieta into Douglas. Camarena had purchased a concrete mixing company in

Douglas and was struggling to make a go of his new business.

When he first bought the business, things weren't going that well. It wasn't successful.

area of Agua Prieta, had all the amenities that come with success.

Mr. Camarena seemed to be a good husband and a good father. This gentleman was a type of

would want to be as your friend. He was a type of person that you would enjoy inviting over

In reality, Camarena's entire life was nothing but a devious facade created to cover up a

U.S. Customs officials received information that Camarena was smuggling drugs from his

business was located one block away from the U.S. Customs headquarters.

Early 1990, we initiated 24-hour surveillance of the Douglas Ready Mix company.

Agents staked out Camarena's business for over two months.

Yes, it's coming in all right.

They became suspicious of a flatbed truck that arrived and departed from a new warehouse

nearly every day.

On one occasion, we followed the tractor trailer rig from Douglas Ready Mix to a rural area

57

outside of Phoenix, Arizona.

A special task force comprised of U.S. Customs agents and other law enforcement officers

59

raided a farm where Camarena's truck had been seen.

Agents seized over a ton of nearly pure cocaine, street value over \$100 million.

61

The cocaine had been transported inside a hidden compartment beneath the truck's bed.

The raid confirmed that the drugs had come from Camarena's warehouse, but agents were

63

baffled. How had Camarena managed to smuggle drugs into his warehouse, which was being

watched around the clock by federal agents just a block away?

We began receiving bits and pieces of information from a variety of sources concerning the existence

Two days later, agents from the United States and Mexico launched simultaneous raids on

Mexican authorities arrested two men who claimed to be gardeners. Camarena and his family had

70

fled. There was no visible evidence of a tunnel.

At the Douglas warehouse, U.S. agents had first found nothing unusual. Then they came upon

72

a large floor drain.

All right, I think we got something here. Let's get the grate off.

We found about a five and a half diameter shaft that went 30 feet into the ground. And

at the bottom of the shaft, we found the tunnel itself.

This is the actual tunnel through which between 15 and 25 tons of cocaine may have been smuggled.

The execution was really very good. The floor, the side walls, and the roof were all concrete.

The tunnel itself extended 200 plus feet into Mexico.

When authorities uncovered the tunnel's entrance beneath Camarena's home, it became clear that

80

this was no ordinary drug smuggling operation. It was something right out of a James Bond

81

Hydraulic pedestals lifted the pool table at a two ton section of concrete floor to expose

83

the entrance. Huge amounts of drugs could be stored below until they were ready to be

moved across the border.

The drugs were transported on a specially designed cart. At the Douglas End, a custom

made hoist lifted the illegal cargo into the warehouse.

Workers packed the cocaine bricks into the false bottom of the truck. A contraband was

Camarena's choice of a building supply company and a cement company was very good in that

In my 18 years with the Customs Service, this is one of the most amazing investigations

tunnel itself, just demonstrates to what extremes these organizations will go to.

Mr. Camarena didn't seem at all like a drug dealer. He didn't dress like a drug dealer.

He didn't come across personality-wise as a drug dealer. He just seemed like a good

family man.

Recently, we feature the case of 46-year-old Dennis DePew, wanted by Michigan authorities

102

for the brutal murder of his ex-wife Marilyn. DePew was last seen on the day of the murder

driving his customized van.

At around 8.30 on the night of our broadcast, a woman who asked that we call her Mary arrived

105

at her home outside Dallas, Texas. Mary's boyfriend, Hank Queen, was already home.

106

00:12:17,960 --> 00:12:24,960

His van was parked in the driveway, which was out of the ordinary because he usually kept

107

it inside the garage.

108

00:12:29,960 --> 00:12:36,960

He told me that his mother was very ill and that he needed to make an emergency trip home.

109

I was sure that something else must really be going on, but I didn't know what.

He was getting clothes out of the closet, clothes out of some drawers, gathering up

111

some of his personal items. At the same time, giving me instructions on preparing some food

The next day, Marilyn DePue's body was discovered in a roadside ditch, nine miles from her home.

She had been shot once in the back of the head.

It was so brutal and premeditated that it makes you so angry.

128

If she had been killed in an automobile accident, you could get over that, but not this.

For nearly a year, Dennis DePue's whereabouts remained a mystery until the night of our

130

broadcast.

131

00:14:55,620 --> 00:15:02,620

Looking back on it now, I'm sure he was watching and I think that he was deliberately keeping

132

00:15:03,780 --> 00:15:09,980

my attention distracted in the kitchen so that I wouldn't see the segment and so that

133

00:15:09,980 --> 00:15:12,860

he could leave.

134

00:15:12,860 --> 00:15:16,980

A friend of Mary's called our telecenter and provided authorities with a Texas license

135

00:15:16,980 --> 00:15:23,980

plate number of Dennis DePue's van. Four hours later, DePue's life came to a violent end,

136

00:15:23,980 --> 00:15:29,820

just across the Louisiana, Mississippi state border.

137

00:15:29,820 --> 00:15:35,820

When Louisiana state troopers spotted DePue's van, they attempted to pull him over. He led

138

00:15:35,820 --> 00:15:42,820

police on a 15-mile high-speed chase and broke through two police barricades.

139

I told the devil is if the van refused to stop to shoot a tire off over the front tire

140

00:15:51,020 --> 00:15:57,020

and they missed the front tire but they got both back ones. He traveled about half a mile

141

and just wouldn't go any further than he stopped.

142

00:16:00,940 --> 00:16:05,700

After firing two shots through his windshield at deputies and another through an open window,

143

DePue turned his gun on himself and took his own life.

It was a funny feeling to realize that the night before that you had been watching this

145

man that he was wanted for murder someplace and then you walk up to the van and you recognize

146

00:16:22,140 --> 00:16:27,060

him as being the person that was on unsolved mysteries. It's a funny feeling. But I think

147

he intended to die whether he had to do it by his own hands or where he could get us to

148

kill him. Otherwise, he would have stopped and we'd have gotten him out of the van alive

149

While living as a fugitive, Dennis DePue sent a chilling letter to several friends, tried

151

to justify his ex-wife's death. He wrote,

An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth, a lie for a lie, a life for a life. At the time,

153

Dennis DePue had no idea just how prophetic those words would be.

Jeannie Wagner was born in 1959 into a typical blue collar household. Her father was a construction

155

worker, her mother a secretary in a doctor's office. Jeannie was a first of three children

156

and enjoyed a healthy normal childhood, at least by outward appearances.

157

From a very early age, I felt very different and separated from my family. I felt like

158

I didn't look like anybody and for a while there I thought, well, you know, maybe I was

159

adopted and no one intentionally made me feel that way. I don't think that it was just a

160

knowledge I had that was, I guess, in my subconscious. Consciously, you know, it was, you know, a family,

her mother's painful past. Jeannie's mother, Patsy Summers, was just 17 years old when she

married. She was shy, private and had been raised in a strict home.

My mother was a very devoutly religious Catholic. I had perfect etiquette and was very concerned about

her image to other people. But there was something within my mother that prevented her from being

a whole person. There were times my mother was very happy, very carefree and so much fun to be with,

but then there were times where she was very, very sad. Even as a child, Jeannie suspected that her

mother was tormented by some private demon. In 1973, when Jeannie was 13, Patsy Summers attempted to

commit suicide by slitting her wrists. Eight years later, Patsy entered a highway against traffic

and smashed head-on into an approaching car. She died 10 days later.

Hello? Shortly after her mother's death, Jeannie called her younger sister and was dealt another

startling blow. Her sister had found a diary which revealed the source of their mother's inner pain.

I think you better come over. The man Jeannie knew as her father was not her father at all.

There's a diary of mothers I want you to read. When I read the diary, it was as if all of a sudden,

all the things that had transpired in my life and in my mother's life and in my life, the family life

180

that I had known, everything all of a sudden made sense. In the diary, Patsy had described the

181

incredible predicament she had gotten into when she was 17. In 1958, Patsy Summers was living at

home with her mother and younger brother. She was an obedient daughter who excelled in school and

attended church regularly. Our mother had very high standards. She came from a Catholic

184

background and we had a very Catholic upbringing. We went to parochial schools and our home was one

185

where we went to church every Sunday. And that was very, very important to our mother. She set a

186

good example and she did expect, you know, she expected us to follow the things that were right.

My mother had been going with a boy off and on for about a year. Her mother and her brothers and

sister liked him a lot. They thought he was very responsible and very polite and he drove a nice

car back then that was real important and they had fought off and on through their relationship.

The diary detailed how Patsy had gone to a local park one day after an argument with her boyfriend.

There she met a young enlisted man stationed at nearby Fort Bliss. His name was Duncan.

Hello. Hi. Do you mind if I sit down? Thanks. I'm Duncan. Don Patricia. Patsy was immediately

smitten by this handsome soldier who seemed so gentle and understanding. It's pretty

beautiful, isn't it? Yeah. Come here and think. Soon they were seeing each other on a regular

basis.

Can I meet you here tomorrow? My mother talked to him a lot and confided in him.

Was he a new uncle? And she thought of Duncan as a very kind person and even stated that of all

the people that she had known that he was the kindest person she had ever met.
