Against his attorney's advice, Maloney has to be committed to the Rochester State Mental Hospital for psychiatric evaluation.

This is the Shroud. It is 3 1 half feet wide and 14 feet long. The brown marks and lines on either side of the image are the results of a fire. After the fire, these triangular patches were sewn on by nuns.

This Renaissance painting shows how the 14 foot long Shroud would have covered the body of Jesus, front and back.

On the second half of the Shroud, there is a rear image showing a man of powerful bill 5 feet 10 inches in height. The faint imprints between the scorch marks are the source of hundreds of years of controversy.

When I first began to study the Shroud of Turin, I was convinced it was a crock and that it would take me probably less than two hours to put away this pious fraud.

The body shows a number of injuries. On the head, we see a series of blood stains around the forehead, high in the scalp, and along the posterior portion of the scalp.
