Eight days after the eclipse, Jaime presented the Aragin footage

68

as part of a special UFO broadcast.

The network was inundated with phone calls.

70

We asked the people in Mexico to bring their videos to us

because we like to see if in the eclipse they had recorded the same stuff.

The telephone lines blew up.

I mean, 40,000 calls at the same time.

Then the system was completely shut out.

We received more than 15 videos and we now know for sure

One of the many videos was sent by Eric Aguilar,

He was setting up to film the eclipse from a rooftop

when his girlfriend spotted something unusual in the sky.

We all turned to look.

83

My girlfriend commented that it was a UFO, but we thought it was a joke.

No one really believed her when she said she saw a UFO.

But within moments, they all decided that the object was not a joke at all.

We saw that this dot, it wasn't a dot anymore.

It was a larger object, and it was giving off light.

It was shining.

At virtually the same time, 60 miles from Mexico City,

96

a businessman named Luis Lara photographed a similar object.

As I raised the camera, you could see something in the clouds.

And it was a metal object, and it looked like it was made of two plates.

You can distinguish a dome and it turned on its own axis.

It was silver-plated, a color like aluminum.

You could see clearly it's not a star.

It's a UFO because it had a shadow underneath.

If it were a star or a planet, you would see clearly that it would be completely luminous.

But this one had a little shadow underneath.

Yet another video was shot by the Breton family in Puebla,

a city 80 miles east of Mexico City.

Magnifying the Breton video revealed an odd wave-like disturbance behind the pulsating disc,

perhaps some kind of energy trail.

Jaime Maussan enhanced the Aragine footage and compared it to the Breton tape.

110

The objects, though photographed nearly 100 miles apart, were remarkably similar in every aspect.

The video from Puebla was absolutely identical to the one we had seen with Aragine in Mexico.

It was for the first time in history.

113

Never before you had a tape of two UFOs in two different places at exactly the same moment.

The videos caused a sensation throughout Mexico, but the UFO craze was just beginning.

Two months later, an engineer named Vicente Sanchez took his video camera to a military air show in Mexico City.

I was following one of the planes and I saw a shiny dot in the camera.

I didn't know what it was, but it seemed to be moving. It was undulating.

118

So I let the planes go off and I focused more on this shiny dot in the sky.

What I saw was a bright, round object, about 10 meters in diameter.

120

It was made of silver, was shining very brightly and reflected the sunlight a lot.

The object appeared, undulated, and moved around very quickly.

A year later, a similar object was videotaped at the same air show.

This time the disc descended rapidly and mysteriously disappeared.

By the time the 1993 air show rolled around, people anticipated another sighting.

Sure enough, just as a squadron of helicopters flew by, the familiar metallic disc appeared.

It was traveling against the wind, so much so that had it been a balloon,

128

considering the force of the helicopter blades, it would have crashed.

But no, it kept on its path very, very straight and steady till it got lost in the sky.

Optical enhancement of this video seems to reveal that the object crossed in close proximity to the

helicopters.

Curiously, the military has consistently declined to address the matter.

The military hasn't made any comment on that sighting or any sighting.

The witnesses range from pilots to doctors to bus drivers and even school children.

These drawings are made by a class of fifth graders who allegedly saw UFOs in March of 1993.

The pictures are strikingly similar in detail.

140

Three shining lights with the brightest light in the center.

141

The objects were silver with red.

142

One of them was coming down and the other one that you could see in the sky was silver.

143

When they were a little lower, you could see the shape of the objects.

They were like saucers with a dome, everything silver.

145

And though it was harder to see, there seemed to be a kind of reddish magnetic field all around it.

We haven't found a single reason why these little kids made this story up.

147

There were so many and when you talk to them, you can feel the honesty that they transmit.

They are just little kids. They don't care about the UFO conspiracy.

149

They don't care about if they are real or not. They saw what they saw.

150

People really like UFOs. People really believe in UFOs.

151

00:11:43,600 --> 00:11:50,600

And we are now convinced that we are living an incredible experience as a country, as a society.

152

00:11:50,600 --> 00:11:54,600

Because it's everywhere. It's not just one people.

153

00:11:54,600 --> 00:11:59,600

It's many people with their eyes in the sky and a camera in their hands.

154

00:11:59,600 --> 00:12:05,600

Now it's the video era and the video is going to solve the UFO mystery.

155

Are the Mexico UFOs real? It is difficult to deny the startling images captured on videotape.

156

Though a determined skeptic would no doubt find some basis to discount the entire episode.

157

But for those who have actually witnessed the mysterious objects in the skies over Mexico, seeing is believing.

158

Next, a bizarre murder mystery in which three people, including the victims twin brother, accuse each other of pulling the trigger.

On June 7th, 1992, the George Washington National Forest in Virginia was visited by murder.

160

That morning, the body of 36-year-old Sammy Wheeler was found in the back seat of his sport vehicle.

161

Sammy had been shot six times in the head and upper torso.

162

Both the local sheriff's department and the FBI investigated.

163

00:13:11,600 --> 00:13:16,600

They quickly determined that the killer had gone to great lengths to clean the crime scene.

164

00:13:16,600 --> 00:13:23,600

All shell casings and fingerprints had been removed and an amateurish attempt had been made to destroy the evidence.

165

There was an apparent effort to try and ignite the vehicle.

166

There was some paper and tissue stuffed in the gas cap.

167

The gas cap had been opened and apparently a cigarette laid there lit in an effort to try.

168

There was some burning around there, but it didn't ignite and didn't take effect.

169

When investigators discovered that Sammy's wallet was missing, the case took on all the earmarks of a random act of violence.

But before long, it would be revealed that at least three people in Sammy Wheeler's life might have watered him dead.

Sammy's twin brother, Danny, Sammy's girlfriend, Pat Snead, and Pat's estranged husband, Bob Bean.

172

00:14:10,600 --> 00:14:17,600

What had begun as a routine investigation quickly became a classic drama of love, lies and murder.

173

00:14:17,600 --> 00:14:25,600

In the months following Sammy Wheeler's death, Danny Wheeler, Pat Snead, and Bob Bean took turns accusing each other of the crime.

174

00:14:25,600 --> 00:14:30,600

In this bizarre and convoluted case, the principles agree on only one thing.

175

00:14:30,600 --> 00:14:35,600

It all started when Sammy Wheeler began dating Pat Snead.

176

00:14:38,600 --> 00:14:44,600

In the fall of 1991, Pat moved into a rental unit owned by Sammy's twin brother, Danny.

177

00:14:44,600 --> 00:14:50,600

The property had been divided into separate apartments. Pat and her two sons lived in one apartment with Sammy.

178

00:14:50,600 --> 00:14:57,600

Danny lived in one of the others. The arrangement suited everyone except Pat's estranged husband, Bob Bean.

179

00:14:59,600 --> 00:15:04,600

The situation was not really what was in the best interest of my children.

180

00:15:05,600 --> 00:15:12,600

I had approached Pat and asked her to please stop this living arrangement here, okay?

181

00:15:15,600 --> 00:15:30,600

We won't get into responses, but anyway, I felt that I was forced into going to court to at least provide some kind, or try to provide some kind of moral environment for my children.

182

00:15:31,600 --> 00:15:37,600

In February, a court order was issued that prohibited Sammy from being with Pat in the presence of the boys.

183

00:15:37,600 --> 00:15:41,600

To comply, Sammy moved into his twin brother's apartment.

184

00:15:45,600 --> 00:15:53,600

Bob Bean remained suspicious. He hired a private investigator to ensure that the court order was being obeyed.

185

00:15:56,600 --> 00:16:03,600

Bob's private investigator came in and testified that Sammy had violated the court's order.

186

00:16:03,600 --> 00:16:10,600

Sammy never found out whether or not the judge believed that. I know for sure, Sam did not violate that court order.

187

00:16:10,600 --> 00:16:19,600

But just to be safe, he stayed away from the house then. He was living in a truck without even a bathroom or a shower, just to appease Bob Bean.

188

00:16:20,600 --> 00:16:22,600

So where are you going to stay tonight?

189

00:16:22,600 --> 00:16:24,600

I'm going to stay in the car.

190

00:16:24,600 --> 00:16:26,600

I hate it when you sleep in the car.

191

00:16:26,600 --> 00:16:30,600

I mean, I can't give them any more ammunition than they've already got.

192

00:16:30,600 --> 00:16:34,600

I never harbored any ill will at all towards Sam.

193

00:16:34,600 --> 00:16:42,600

People around here have a hard time understanding how a man can accept that his wife is leaving him for another man.

194

00:16:43,600 --> 00:16:50,600

Well, to be honest with you, I knew what I had and I was thankful to pass it on, okay?

195

00:16:50,600 --> 00:17:01,600

But after getting to know Sam, I kind of felt sorry for him and I wanted to sit down and prepare him for what he was getting.

196

00:17:02,600 --> 00:17:11,600

Bob hated Sam. Sam knew it and I knew it. Bob says otherwise because I believe Bob is a pathological liar.

197

00:17:12,600 --> 00:17:23,600

Sam expressed to me that he felt that my ex-husband Bob was capable of pretty much anything. He did not trust him.

198

00:17:26,600 --> 00:17:38,600

On June 3rd, four days before he was murdered, Sammy left Danny's apartment at 5.30 a.m. and chanced upon an unexpected visitor, Bob Bean's teenage son from a previous marriage.

Where?

200

00:17:44,600 --> 00:17:46,600

What are you doing?

201

00:17:46,600 --> 00:17:48,600

Just taking a few pictures.

202

00:17:48,600 --> 00:17:54,600

Yeah, I see that. You tell your dad I'm staying in the apartment, okay? With Danny. I'm not in the house, I'm not with Pat, I'm not with the kids.

203

00:17:54,600 --> 00:17:57,600

I'm with my brother in the apartment, just like I'm supposed to be.

204

00:17:57,600 --> 00:17:59,600

Okay, I'm just taking some pictures.

205

00:17:59,600 --> 00:18:00,600

Okay, we'll cut it out, huh?

206

00:18:00,600 --> 00:18:01,600

No more pictures, guys?

207

00:18:01,600 --> 00:18:02,600

No more pictures.

208

00:18:02,600 --> 00:18:03,600

All right.

209

00:18:03,600 --> 00:18:10,600

I thought that was very, very strange for somebody to be taken, my twin brother's photograph at 5.30 in the morning.

210

00:18:10,600 --> 00:18:12,600

I didn't like it at all.

211

00:18:15,600 --> 00:18:22,600

That Saturday, at around 9.15 p.m., Sammy set off for Elkhorn Lake, approximately 40 miles from his house.

212

00:18:22,600 --> 00:18:27,600

He planned to spend the night in his truck and begin fishing early the next day.

213

00:18:30,600 --> 00:18:33,600

12 hours later, Sammy Wheeler was dead.

214

00:18:35,600 --> 00:18:38,600

I believe Bob Bean had a motive to kill my brother.

215

00:18:40,600 --> 00:18:46,600

Pat's divorce from Bob was going to be final on Tuesday. They were going to be married on Thursday.

216

00:18:47,600 --> 00:18:50,600

Sammy was killed on Sunday.

217

00:18:51,600 --> 00:18:59,600

Just by coincidence. Just by coincidence. Sure it was. Sure it was a coincidence. Sure it was.

218

00:18:59,600 --> 00:19:02,600

Now Michael Jordan, too. I used to play for the Chicago Bulls.

219

00:19:03,600 --> 00:19:10,600

Go talk to the people who know me, okay, and ask them if I was really upset if Pat was leaving.

220

00:19:10,600 --> 00:19:13,600

Okay, the answer to that is no.

221

00:19:16,600 --> 00:19:18,600

So there's no motive.

222

00:19:20,600 --> 00:19:27,600

On the face of it, Bob Bean was a perfect suspect, but he also had what appeared to be the perfect alibi.

223

00:19:27,600 --> 00:19:32,600

When Sammy was murdered, Bean was on maneuvers with his Army National Guard unit.

224

00:19:33,600 --> 00:19:40,600

The night that he was killed, I was on duty until 11 o'clock that night.

225

00:19:41,600 --> 00:19:45,600

Now the death certificate indicates the time of death at 1 o'clock.

226

00:19:47,600 --> 00:19:51,600

The camp that I was at is about 150 miles away.

227

00:19:51,600 --> 00:20:01,600

There was no way that I could physically get from the camp to the murder scene in that amount of time to kill Sam.

228

00:20:01,600 --> 00:20:03,600

It's just physically impossible.

229

00:20:03,600 --> 00:20:09,600

One of our men from our department at the time was in the same unit and remembers seeing Bob there.

230

00:20:09,600 --> 00:20:11,600

So things checked out pretty good for him.

231

00:20:12,600 --> 00:20:20,600

I feel like that Bob Bean knew just as soon as Sam Wheeler was found dead, he knew they were going to come knocking on his door.

232

00:20:20,600 --> 00:20:23,600

So he knew that he better have his story right.

233

00:20:25,600 --> 00:20:31,600

Danny Wheeler believes that Bob Bean later gave the photographs that his teenage son took to a professional hitman.

234

00:20:33,600 --> 00:20:44,600

You'd have to pay for the hitman and the FBI investigated my finances and I don't have quite what it takes to pay a professional.

235

00:20:45,600 --> 00:20:58,600
