It is called remote viewing.

The goal is to witness distant events

65

and gather information by harnessing

the psychic power of the mind.

For at least two decades, American intelligence

68

agencies employed this technique.

69

Most recently, codenamed Stargate.

70

It was a top secret espionage program

71

the government never wanted you to know about.

David Morehouse certainly never expected

73

00:04:42,860 --> 00:04:45,140

to be the man to blow the whistle on it.

David Morehouse was third generation army, the son

75

00:04:53,020 --> 00:04:55,540

and grandson of career officers.

76

He graduated from Brigham Young University

77

00:04:57,820 --> 00:04:59,620

at the top of his class.

78

00:04:59,620 --> 00:05:02,100

His background and ROTC training put him

79

00:05:02,100 --> 00:05:03,660

on the military fast track.

80

By 1987, Morehouse was a company commander with the Rangers,

81

the army's elite fighting unit.

82

In March of that year, he was sent to the Kingdom of Jordan

83

to take part in a desert training exercise.

But a stray machine gun bullet would soon

85

change his life forever.

The bullet large in Morehouse's helmet,

87

knocking him out cold.

It was then that he claims the experienced

89

a vision of overwhelming power.

90

I had a messenger, or I could call it an angel or a spirit,

91

that came to me during this time that I was knocked out.

I had spent some 13 years of my life practicing the art

Nightmares so debilitating, they drove him

104

to an army psychologist.

The psychologist suspected that concussion

106

had somehow released in Morehouse a latent psychic faculty.

107

I half hoped that this individual would have me taken away

108

00:06:37,540 --> 00:06:41,580

and evaluated and medicated and make it all stop.

Instead, what he did do was walk over to a file safe

110

and pull out three blue folders that

David Morehouse volunteered to join the unit.

to use biofeedback to control his brain waves

132

and send his consciousness to the far points of the globe.

I can feel the warmth of the sun on my back

134

and the cold on my nostrils.

135

I was obviously apparitional in form,

136

and I was hovering above whatever it was

137

00:08:04,200 --> 00:08:06,200

from a very close distance.

138

And I was moving.

139

00:08:08,180 --> 00:08:09,980

It wasn't the object that was moving.

140

I was moving across the object.

Peeking, dropping sharply.

Hell, I don't know.

During practice sessions, the monitor placed a photograph

145

of the target site in an envelope across the room.

146

His first time out, David Morehouse

147

00:08:31,500 --> 00:08:33,700

demonstrated yet genuine ability.

148

My first target was Mount Fuji.

149

00:08:37,040 --> 00:08:38,200

I was shocked.

150

00:08:38,200 --> 00:08:40,000

I didn't believe it.

151

00:08:40,000 --> 00:08:43,080

In that instant, I had gone to Mount Fuji

152

00:08:43,080 --> 00:08:47,280

and was describing what I saw, smelled, heard, and felt

153

00:08:47,280 --> 00:08:50,480

at that location.

154

00:08:50,480 --> 00:08:52,480

Over the next year, David Morehouse

155

00:08:52,480 --> 00:08:55,520

worked with seven other remote viewers at Operation Stargate,

156

00:08:55,520 --> 00:08:58,560

steadily refining his psychic talents.

157

00:08:58,560 --> 00:09:00,520

One of his most difficult assignments

158

00:09:00,520 --> 00:09:03,520

came on February 18, when he was in the office

159

00:09:03,540 --> 00:09:07,220

on February 17, 1988.

160

00:09:07,220 --> 00:09:10,100

On that day, Marine Lieutenant Colonel William Higgins

161

00:09:10,100 --> 00:09:12,340

was taken hostage in Beirut, Lebanon

162

00:09:12,340 --> 00:09:14,820

by a group of Shiite Muslims.

163

00:09:14,820 --> 00:09:17,260

Colonel Higgins was head of the United Nations group

164

00:09:17,260 --> 00:09:22,260

monitoring the fragile truce between Israel and Lebanon.

165

00:09:22,260 --> 00:09:24,300

My god, it's him.

166

00:09:24,300 --> 00:09:26,260

Are you certain?

167

00:09:26,260 --> 00:09:27,980

Of course I am.

168

00:09:27,980 --> 00:09:30,420

This is Colonel Higgins.

169

00:09:30,420 --> 00:09:31,580

English.

170

00:09:31,640 --> 00:09:32,640

You want the English?

171

00:09:32,640 --> 00:09:33,640

Who sent you?

172

00:09:33,640 --> 00:09:36,160

Morehouse says he and the other remote viewers,

173

00:09:36,160 --> 00:09:39,280

desperate to find Higgins, began a marathon series

174

00:09:39,280 --> 00:09:41,640

of psychic sessions.

175

00:09:41,640 --> 00:09:43,640

He's not doing well.

176

00:09:43,640 --> 00:09:44,760

He looks worse.

177

00:09:44,760 --> 00:09:47,000

Don't just call me Colonel.

178

00:09:47,000 --> 00:09:49,360

Even though we could see him being moved

179

00:09:49,360 --> 00:09:52,240

and we could describe that his surroundings in the room

180

00:09:52,240 --> 00:09:54,360

and the beatings and his physical conditioning

181

00:09:54,360 --> 00:09:57,160

and his emotional condition, we still could not

182

00:09:57,160 --> 00:10:00,000

or were not ever able to provide an address that

183

00:10:00,020 --> 00:10:04,020

would allow a rescue team to go in and affect the hostage

184

00:10:04,020 --> 00:10:06,140

rescue.

185

00:10:06,140 --> 00:10:07,940

He's going to die.

186

00:10:07,940 --> 00:10:08,860

I can taste it.

187

00:10:16,780 --> 00:10:18,660

Morehouse claims that the remote viewers

188

00:10:18,660 --> 00:10:21,580

psychically sensed Higgins' death a year and a half

189

00:10:21,580 --> 00:10:23,620

into his captivity.

190

00:10:23,620 --> 00:10:25,700

Just a few days later, the kidnapers

191

00:10:25,700 --> 00:10:28,740

confirmed that Colonel Higgins had been murdered.

192

00:10:28,760 --> 00:10:31,840

More than two years would pass before his remains were recovered.

193

00:10:35,000 --> 00:10:37,480

Another major challenge for the remote viewing unit

194

00:10:37,480 --> 00:10:40,920

came just before Christmas in 1988.

195

00:10:40,920 --> 00:10:43,760

On December 21st, Pan Am Flight 103

196

00:10:43,760 --> 00:10:48,080

exploded over Lockerby, Scotland, killing all 259 people

197

00:10:48,080 --> 00:10:51,960

aboard and 11 more on the ground.

198

00:10:51,960 --> 00:10:54,920

Hours later, with the cause of the crash still unknown,

199

00:10:54,920 --> 00:10:58,160

the remote viewers were called into an emergency session.

200

00:10:58,180 --> 00:11:01,500

They were not given any details or a specific target,

201

00:11:01,500 --> 00:11:03,460

only a set of coordinates.

202

00:11:03,460 --> 00:11:06,020

Their visions would prove to be remarkably similar.

203

00:11:12,300 --> 00:11:15,420

I'm having difficulty focusing.

204

00:11:15,420 --> 00:11:17,220

There's a great deal of emotion here.

205

00:11:23,340 --> 00:11:27,420

I see people sitting in a row, some sleeping,

206

00:11:27,440 --> 00:11:30,320

relaxing, some moving about.

207

00:11:32,920 --> 00:11:35,240

I'm going to call this one.

208

00:11:35,240 --> 00:11:38,720

I'm looking at the interior of an airplane.

209

00:11:38,720 --> 00:11:39,720

That's it.

210

00:11:45,560 --> 00:11:48,720

My god, the entire plane is disintegrated.

211

00:11:48,720 --> 00:11:53,160

For us, remote viewers, it was a tremendous emotional toll

212

00:11:53,160 --> 00:11:56,200

to us to watch that catastrophic event take place

213

00:11:56,200 --> 00:12:00,140

and to see the confusion of these souls that

214

00:12:00,140 --> 00:12:01,420

were instantly there.

215

00:12:01,420 --> 00:12:03,620

As everything that was physical about them

216

00:12:03,620 --> 00:12:07,540

plummeted to Earth, their souls remained there

217

00:12:07,540 --> 00:12:11,260

in this ethereal state.

218

00:12:11,260 --> 00:12:14,300

Within a day of the disaster, Morehouse and the other viewers

219

00:12:14,300 --> 00:12:16,740

had pieced together a scenario.

220

00:12:16,740 --> 00:12:20,260

They believed Flight 103 was blown up by a terrorist bomb

221

00:12:20,260 --> 00:12:25,420

hidden inside a suitcase in the forward cargo hold.

222

00:12:25,440 --> 00:12:28,760

Amazingly, after two months of detailed investigation,

223

00:12:28,760 --> 00:12:32,120

the FBI and the Scottish police came to that exact conclusion.

224

At Fort Meade, Morehouse continued his psychic sessions,

225

00:12:38,800 --> 00:12:41,280

but he was becoming disillusioned.

226

He claims a program's leaders were pushing the remote viewers

227

00:12:44,400 --> 00:12:47,960

to use their minds as tactical weapons.

228

We were starting to develop the protocols

229

00:12:50,640 --> 00:12:52,960

to be able to access the mind of another human being

230

00:12:52,960 --> 00:12:56,260

for the purpose of destruction or death.

231

And that is when I finally drew the line and said,

232

I cannot any longer be a part of this.

233

I can't see this tremendous gift turned

234

David Morehouse decided to violate his security oath

237

The government's response was swift.

239

Morehouse chose to resign his commission and leave the army.

241

He eventually wrote a book, Psychic Warrior.

242

In 1995, the CIA admitted the existence of Operation Stargate.

243

In the wake of the negative publicity,

244

the program lost its congressional support

245

00:13:39,600 --> 00:13:40,520

and was shut down.

246

English.

You're the English who sent you.

248

How great are the untapped powers of the human mind?

July 25, 1990, a chilling nightmare for any parent.

Paramedics rushed four-year-old Ashley Berman

263

into an emergency room outside of Los Angeles.

She was unconscious and barely breathing.

Can you tell me how this happened?

266

She apparently had some sort of seizure and fell

267

and hit her head.

268

How far was the fall?

269

It wasn't far.

270

00:15:08,760 --> 00:15:10,200

She just fell on the floor.

271

I don't know.

272

I wasn't there.

273

She was with the nanny.

274

She had these seizures before?

275

Yes.

She's had them before, but it's never been this serious now.

A short time later, the doctor made a stunning accusation.

They would call me up and tell me how lucky I was to have

286

somebody like Rosa.

I did not believe them.

288

With more and more working couples

289

facing the daunting challenge of earning a living

290

and raising a family, many parents

291

have been forced to rely on live-in nannies

292

to care for their children.

293

Most of the time, it's the beginning

294

of a loving and wonderful relationship.

295

But every so often, as in the case of Jeff and Sharon Berman,

296

parents discovered that they have unwittingly subjected

their child to a reign of terror.

That first day, Rosa was accompanied

304

by her cousin, who helped to translate.

305

Rosa was very highly recommended by various neighbors.

306

One neighbor that she worked for a couple years beforehand,

307

who swore by her that said that she was wonderful,

308

00:16:49,660 --> 00:16:53,020

and that she would be perfect to watch our daughter,

309

00:16:53,040 --> 00:16:54,840

and that she had experience with kids,

310

and she was very good at what she did.

311

But how would Ashley respond to Rosa?

312

For a year, all went well.

Then, however, Ashley began suffering

from a series of mysterious injuries.

Every time we asked Ashley, what happened,

That she heard her hand on the swing

343

that a little boy hit her with a shovel, another child

344

hit her with a Barbie.

345

There was always an answer that it happened at school.

346

Let's take a look here.

According to Rosa, Ashley had been periodically

355

blacking out and experiencing seizures.

Although the Bermans never witnessed an episode themselves,

357

they feared Ashley had developed a serious physiological

disorder.

359

We put Ashley through all kinds of tests.

360

We put her through CAT scans, MRIs,

361

which were very difficult to get a 4 and 1 1 1 1 year old child

362

00:19:01,180 --> 00:19:03,340

into an MRI.

363

00:19:03,340 --> 00:19:06,620

With all the tests, they could find absolutely nothing

364

00:19:06,620 --> 00:19:11,860

that related that she had any tendency really towards seizures.

365

00:19:11,860 --> 00:19:16,740

All indications was is that she was a very healthy child.

366

00:19:16,760 --> 00:19:20,200

A few months later, Jeff Berman came home early from a walk

367

00:19:20,200 --> 00:19:23,160

to find that his very healthy child had once again

368

00:19:23,160 --> 00:19:24,640

been severely injured.

369

00:19:24,640 --> 00:19:26,640

La, la,

370

00:19:26,640 --> 00:19:28,640

la, la,

371

00:19:28,640 --> 00:19:30,640

la, la,

372

00:19:30,640 --> 00:19:31,200

come here, come down.

373

00:19:31,200 --> 00:19:32,080

What happened?

374

00:19:32,080 --> 00:19:33,080

She tripped.

375

00:19:33,080 --> 00:19:33,880

She tripped.

376

00:19:33,880 --> 00:19:35,400

I don't know if that would have been to trip.

377

And Rosa proceeded to tell me that Ashley had fallen down.

378

She was wearing some shoes, and she tripped, and she fell down.

And I felt comfortable that she had just fallen.

I saw the shoes.

The shoes were on the kitchen floor.

So when, again, the scene was reenacted by Ashley,

383

it all made sense.

Can you tell me what happened?

385

Just nine days later, came Ashley Berman's frightening

I was just like, just quick check here.

388

I thought Ashley was going to die on us.

389

00:20:04,420 --> 00:20:05,380

I mean, I just looked at her.

390

She was all pale, hooked up.

391

00:20:08,940 --> 00:20:10,980

And I thought we were going to lose her.

392

00:20:10,980 --> 00:20:13,060

And pretty much what we were told, if she survived,

393

00:20:13,060 --> 00:20:16,240

if she lived, she'd more than likely be retarded or blind,

394

00:20:16,240 --> 00:20:17,240

or both.

395

00:20:17,240 --> 00:20:21,120

All right.

396

00:20:21,120 --> 00:20:24,440

Give me a CAT scan, full set of lab, and run the IVT-CAT.

397

After I examined Ashley, I was suspicious that Ashley

398

might have been abused.

399

00:20:29,840 --> 00:20:33,720

She had some small hemorrhages in the retina.

400

00:20:33,720 --> 00:20:35,480

This is a condition that's associated

401

00:20:35,480 --> 00:20:38,080

with shaken baby syndrome.

402

00:20:38,080 --> 00:20:41,680

Dr. Gillingham decided to check into Ashley's medical history

403

00:20:41,700 --> 00:20:43,380

and phoned her pediatrician.

404

00:20:43,380 --> 00:20:46,020

I have one of your patients here in Ashley Berman.

405

00:20:46,020 --> 00:20:50,020

She's showing signs of retinal hemorrhaging.

406

00:20:50,020 --> 00:20:53,540

It wasn't until I spoke with Ashley's pediatrician

407

00:20:53,540 --> 00:20:56,700

that we made a connection to a prior case

408

00:20:56,700 --> 00:21:01,940

where the same caregiver had been involved in taking care

409

00:21:01,940 --> 00:21:04,100

of a child who died of what they thought

410

00:21:04,100 --> 00:21:05,420

might be child abuse.

411

00:21:05,420 --> 00:21:06,700

This is way number two.

412

00:21:06,700 --> 00:21:09,780

For the Berman's, it was a shocking piece of news.

413

00:21:09,780 --> 00:21:11,680

Two years earlier, Dr. Gillingham

414

00:21:11,680 --> 00:21:13,880

had treated a 17-month-old boy who

415

00:21:13,880 --> 00:21:17,800

was rushed to the hospital in a state of full cardiac arrest.

416

00:21:17,800 --> 00:21:19,680

That day, the toddler had reportedly

417

00:21:19,680 --> 00:21:22,280

been in the care of Rosa Hernandez,

418

00:21:22,280 --> 00:21:23,960

the Berman's knew of the incident,

419

00:21:23,960 --> 00:21:27,160

but had heard the boy choked on a hotdog.

420

00:21:27,160 --> 00:21:29,040

We were able to resuscitate the child,

421

00:21:29,040 --> 00:21:32,280

get the child breathing, and with a good blood pressure

422

00:21:32,280 --> 00:21:33,240

and pulse.

423

00:21:33,240 --> 00:21:35,840

The child was subsequently admitted to the hospital,

424

00:21:35,860 --> 00:21:41,140

but then died within the next, I think, 17 or 18 hours.

425

An autopsy revealed that the boy had a fractured skull

426

00:21:43,740 --> 00:21:45,340

with internal bleeding.

427

His death was ruled a homicide.

428

However, there was not enough evidence

429

00:21:49,260 --> 00:21:52,740

to file charges against Rosa Hernandez.

430

Now with Ashley Berman fighting for her life,

431

00:21:55,140 --> 00:21:57,700

police believe they had a case against Hernandez.

432

00:21:57,700 --> 00:22:00,020

She was charged with child abuse and murder.

433

00:22:00,020 --> 00:22:01,660

Hello, Ashley.

434

00:22:01,660 --> 00:22:02,860

I never heard her.

435

00:22:02,860 --> 00:22:04,340

I love her.

436

00:22:04,340 --> 00:22:06,600

Now Rosa's first reaction was she looked at me

437

00:22:06,600 --> 00:22:09,200

with an evil look in her face and said, why, Mr.

438

00:22:09,200 --> 00:22:10,080

Why?

439

00:22:10,080 --> 00:22:12,120

I love Ashley.

440

00:22:12,120 --> 00:22:13,320

I love Ashley.

441

00:22:13,320 --> 00:22:14,200

And then they let her out.

442

00:22:19,280 --> 00:22:21,240

Ashley spent a full week in the hospital

443

00:22:21,240 --> 00:22:23,800

and eventually made a complete recovery.

444

00:22:23,800 --> 00:22:26,400

Today, she is 11 years old and more than willing

445

00:22:26,400 --> 00:22:30,800

to talk about her experiences with Rosa Hernandez.

446

00:22:30,800 --> 00:22:34,420

She used to push me down the steps.

447

00:22:34,420 --> 00:22:38,700

She would, I would hide her remote control to get her back.

448

00:22:38,700 --> 00:22:42,260

And so she took silverware and hit my nails.

449

00:22:42,260 --> 00:22:44,420

And she would also take her earrings

450

00:22:44,420 --> 00:22:47,140

and poke them through my nails.

451

00:22:47,140 --> 00:22:51,260

And she would bang my head against the walls, the doors,

452

00:22:51,260 --> 00:22:54,380

and the wood floors.

453

00:22:54,380 --> 00:22:57,060

In March of 1991, Rosa Hernandez

454

00:22:57,060 --> 00:23:00,380

pleaded guilty to involuntary manslaughter and child abuse.

455

00:23:00,980 --> 00:23:02,900

Despite protests from the Bermans,

456

00:23:02,900 --> 00:23:05,180

she was released on her own recognizance

457

00:23:05,180 --> 00:23:08,740

and promptly disappeared.

458

00:23:08,740 --> 00:23:11,180

I believe that it's been a long enough period of time

459

00:23:11,180 --> 00:23:12,940

that she feels safe.

460

00:23:12,940 --> 00:23:16,020

And I fear that that's true.

461

00:23:16,020 --> 00:23:18,980

Because if it is, she's back in the States

462

00:23:18,980 --> 00:23:21,660

and she may be babysitting right now.

463

00:23:21,660 --> 00:23:27,180

Another child that's going to fall victim to her abuse.

464

00:23:27,180 --> 00:23:30,500

Today, some seven years after her traumatic ordeal,

465

00:23:30,520 --> 00:23:33,120

Ashley Berman has a younger brother and sister

466

00:23:33,120 --> 00:23:34,840

and a bright and promising future.

467

Every time that I look at her, I visualize

468

00:23:41,440 --> 00:23:44,960

what could have been the fact that she could have died.

469

00:23:44,960 --> 00:23:46,200

She could have been retarded.

470

00:23:46,200 --> 00:23:49,640

She could have had major learning disabilities.

471

00:23:49,640 --> 00:23:53,520

I'm very thankful that we were lucky that Ashley

472

00:23:53,520 --> 00:23:56,640

is a normal, healthy 11-year-old child today.

473

00:23:56,640 --> 00:24:00,000

Because she may not have ever made it past 4 and 1 half.

474

00:24:00,060 --> 00:24:01,500

She would have been 4 and 1 half forever.

475

00:24:05,820 --> 00:24:08,700

Maria Rosa Hernandez, a native of El Salvador,

476

00:24:08,700 --> 00:24:10,780

is now 32 years old.

477

00:24:10,780 --> 00:24:15,340

She is 5 feet 4 inches tall and weighs approximately 130 pounds.

478

00:24:15,340 --> 00:24:17,300

She is a mother of three.

479

00:24:17,300 --> 00:24:19,180

Hernandez speaks broken English and has

480

00:24:19,180 --> 00:24:22,140

what appear to be burned scars on her right upper forearm.

481

00:24:25,540 --> 00:24:29,100

When we return, police enlist the astonishing abilities

482

00:24:29,160 --> 00:24:31,560

of Yogi the Bloodhound in the desperate search

483

00:24:31,560 --> 00:24:32,360

for a little girl.

484

00:24:45,760 --> 00:24:47,240

He doesn't have a badge.

485

00:24:47,240 --> 00:24:49,160

He never went to the police academy.

486

00:24:49,160 --> 00:24:51,720

He doesn't even own a uniform.

487

00:24:51,720 --> 00:24:53,560

But when it comes to tracking down criminals,

488

00:24:53,560 --> 00:24:55,760

he's one of the best.

489

00:24:55,780 --> 00:24:59,180

This is Yogi, a 5-year-old purebred bloodhound,

490

00:24:59,180 --> 00:25:00,940

one of 1,000 bloodhounds currently

491

00:25:00,940 --> 00:25:03,140

working in law enforcement.

492

00:25:03,140 --> 00:25:06,220

Forget all the modern investigating techniques.

493

00:25:06,220 --> 00:25:08,460

In this story, Yogi proves that nothing

494

00:25:08,460 --> 00:25:11,580

beats a remarkable nose of a bloodhound.

495

00:25:11,580 --> 00:25:13,340

Looking for a little girl, sir.

496

00:25:13,340 --> 00:25:17,500

May 18, 1993, police in Englewood, Colorado,

497

00:25:17,500 --> 00:25:19,900

a Denver suburb, searched door to door

498

00:25:19,900 --> 00:25:23,420

for 5-year-old Ali Bareilles.

499

00:25:23,420 --> 00:25:25,660

Ali was last seen playing in the courtyard

500

00:25:25,720 --> 00:25:29,040

of the apartment complex where she lived with her family.

501

00:25:29,040 --> 00:25:32,160

Her babysitter went inside for a few minutes.

502

00:25:32,160 --> 00:25:36,840

When she returned, Ali had disappeared.

503

00:25:36,840 --> 00:25:38,760

The search continued for four days,

504

but police could not find a single clue.

505

Finally, they turned to an age-old crime-fighting tool.

then started moving.

He first went up the stairs, zeroing in

515

on a single apartment, Ali's home.

516

It was a good sign Yogi was on the right track.

517

I wanted to have hope that this bloodhound would

be able to find her granddaughter.

519

From the balcony on the second floor,

520

I was watching the dog work.

521

And I felt there was a sort of comfort that I felt,

522

because I felt now they're going to find her.

523

You know, now they're going to find her,

524

and they're going to find her alive.

525

Yogi led Jerry out of the apartment complex in South,

526

down the street.

527

00:26:51,840 --> 00:26:55,580

The media crush followed close behind, recording every move.

528

The dog wasn't bothered at all.

529

00:26:58,660 --> 00:26:59,580

He didn't care.

530

00:26:59,580 --> 00:27:02,540

He was oblivious to everything other than what he was doing,

531

00:27:02,540 --> 00:27:03,740

because he's happy doing that.

532

00:27:03,740 --> 00:27:04,740

Where is it?

533

00:27:04,740 --> 00:27:05,540

Come on.

534

00:27:05,540 --> 00:27:06,300

Where is it?

535

Well, the bloodhound is by instinct a tracker, by nature.

536

00:27:10,540 --> 00:27:12,220

It's something they're bred to do,

537

00:27:12,220 --> 00:27:13,460

and they live to do.

538

Their sense of smell is just incredible.

539

The loose skin around the face just

540

00:27:18,260 --> 00:27:20,420

hexes a place for the scent to be attracted to,

541

the skin folds, the jowls, the slobbering

542

00:27:23,400 --> 00:27:26,160

is the moisture that the dog is emitting

543

00:27:26,160 --> 00:27:28,720

will actually help enhance that scent around his face.

544

00:27:28,720 --> 00:27:30,440

He's putting the moisture in the air.

545

00:27:30,440 --> 00:27:32,520

And those long dangling floppy ears,

546

00:27:32,520 --> 00:27:35,800

it kind of stirs it up in front of him.

547

00:27:35,800 --> 00:27:37,200

All right, buddy.

548

00:27:37,200 --> 00:27:37,700

Leave it.

549

00:27:37,700 --> 00:27:40,240

A scent trail, whether animal or human,

550

00:27:40,240 --> 00:27:42,360

comes from thousands of dead skin cells

551

00:27:42,360 --> 00:27:44,920

that are constantly being shed.

552

00:27:44,920 --> 00:27:47,560

If those cells are not swept away by weather changes,

553

00:27:47,560 --> 00:27:50,160

like snow, rain, or severe winds,

554

00:27:50,220 --> 00:27:54,140

the scent could remain clear for up to a month.

555

00:27:54,140 --> 00:27:57,020

When a dog is introduced a specific scent to track,

556

00:27:57,020 --> 00:27:59,780

he basically focuses on that scent

557

00:27:59,780 --> 00:28:02,420

and forgets and ignores the rest.

558

00:28:02,420 --> 00:28:04,820

His job is, this is the scent I have to work.

559

00:28:04,820 --> 00:28:07,700

This is where I'm going to go with.

560

00:28:07,700 --> 00:28:10,420

As Yogi followed Allie's scent, Jerry quickly

561

00:28:10,420 --> 00:28:15,260

recognized a familiar pattern in the way the dog was working.

562

00:28:15,260 --> 00:28:19,100

For persons walking on foot, the scent's a little bit stronger,

563

00:28:19,120 --> 00:28:20,720

and they're going to stay by the sidewalk.

564

00:28:20,720 --> 00:28:23,280

But he is working wide between the street

565

00:28:23,280 --> 00:28:25,000

and between the fronts of businesses.

566

00:28:25,000 --> 00:28:26,960

And he's still picking it up on the fringes

567

00:28:26,960 --> 00:28:30,840

and seeing him do that before, just in my mind,

568

00:28:30,840 --> 00:28:32,560

he was working a car.

569

00:28:35,120 --> 00:28:37,920

Unbelievable as it seems, we leave scent trails

570

00:28:37,920 --> 00:28:40,520

even from fast-moving cars.

571

00:28:40,520 --> 00:28:43,120

The skin cells shoot out through the car's ventilation

572

00:28:43,120 --> 00:28:46,560

and exhaust system, not deposited on the side of the road,

573

00:28:46,580 --> 00:28:51,140

where a bloodhounds knowers can quickly pick them up.

574

00:28:51,140 --> 00:28:53,220

We've even done scenarios in training

575

00:28:53,220 --> 00:28:56,020

where we'll put a person in a trunk that's sealed up,

576

00:28:56,020 --> 00:28:58,180

and they still can pick it up.

577

00:28:58,180 --> 00:28:59,660

His world is his nose.

578

00:29:04,900 --> 00:29:07,620

Yogi led the search party south for several miles,

579

00:29:07,620 --> 00:29:10,740

covering almost 40 city blocks.

580

00:29:10,740 --> 00:29:13,340

At the entrance to a freeway, he headed straight up

581

00:29:13,340 --> 00:29:14,380

the westbound ramp.

582

00:29:17,460 --> 00:29:20,340

And I was very skeptical that that dog was doing anything

583

00:29:20,340 --> 00:29:21,660

other than going for a walk.

584

00:29:21,660 --> 00:29:25,940

But when he took that first ramp to I-470

585

00:29:25,940 --> 00:29:28,260

and did so with so much confidence,

586

then I started to wonder, maybe the dog is really

587

been used to create cow and sheep embryos.

However, scientists couldn't engineer a clone

from a fully grown animal, at least not until Dolly.

The whole world now knows who and what she is,

770

the first mammal ever cloned from an adult.

With her birth in Scotland last July,

772

researchers crossed an historic threshold.

773

I have no doubt that we would be able to take the technology that

774

was used in Scotland and perfected with human eggs.

775

And within a few years, with a little bit of tinkering,

they'll be able to clone human beings.

There is much about cloning that we still do not know.

There's no way to prevent some latter day Victor Frankenstein

The presumed difficulty of imposing controls

797

is spawned dire predictions.

798

Perhaps cloning would lead to the creation

799

of a workforce of enslaved clones,

800

a rend and a race of fiendish humanoids without souls.

801

Or perhaps the search for people to clone

802

00:39:20,100 --> 00:39:23,660

will reach beyond the grave.

803

It is possible to free cells.

804

And if the cells are frozen properly,

805

you could bring, for example, a dead person back to life

806

in the sense of bringing his genes back to life.

807

People today could die, have their cells frozen down,

808

and potentially in the future, these people

809

could have clones of themselves born.

It's possible to imagine that we could clone someone

811

from the past who was not just someone who was good,

but also someone who was extremely evil.

If, for example, someone recommended

that we clone Adolf Hitler, the expectation

would be that this would be the same evil leader of the past.

But what we know, of course, is that that

would be an impossibility.

It is impossible because a clone of an adult

doesn't emerge from the lab as another fully formed adult.

Far from it, the clone begins as a microscopic embryo

floating at the bottom of a test tube.

Imagine then that someone did indeed successfully clone

Adolf Hitler.

824

The embryo would have to be implanted into a surrogate

825

mother, carried for nine months until birth,

826

00:40:36,600 --> 00:40:38,920

then raised into adulthood.

827

There is no way to know, let alone guarantee,

828

00:40:41,700 --> 00:40:45,500

who that person would turn out to be.

829

00:40:45,500 --> 00:40:49,500

We don't know what produced Adolf Hitler in the first place,

830

00:40:49,500 --> 00:40:52,700

to what extent was his genetic makeup,

831

00:40:52,700 --> 00:40:57,140

to what extent was it very small variations

832

00:40:57,140 --> 00:40:59,900

in the circumstances of his life.

833

00:40:59,900 --> 00:41:02,180

The new person that is born will look eerily

834

00:41:02,180 --> 00:41:04,540

like the person that already exists,

835

00:41:04,540 --> 00:41:05,980

but it will be a different person.

836

It will have its own personality, its own soul.

837

00:41:09,480 --> 00:41:13,000

The same limits apply to those we might want to see cloned,

838

00:41:13,000 --> 00:41:16,440

people like Albert Einstein or Ben Franklin.

However as tantalizing as it might

seem to resurrect the past, the best use of cloning

appears to be in building the future.

The most obvious advantage of cloning

is for someone who cannot have children

844

For such couples, cloning could be a godsend,

846

but others might see it as an opportunity to cheat death

847

by recreating themselves.

848

There is the fear that people might

849

00:41:47,980 --> 00:41:49,620

want to clone themselves to achieve

850

00:41:49,620 --> 00:41:52,940

an immortality of some sort.

851

And this is the worry that somebody

852

will clone themselves into a child

853

and then expect that child to live the same life that they

The lure of immortality and the potential of cloning

856

There's the worry in many people's mind

859

if their body parts wear out later in life.

Every clone that is born is going

863

to be a complete human being.

The person won't be a subhuman being in any way whatsoever.

865

And if you took a heart out of that person,

866

that would be murder, nothing less than murder.

Cloning is like a hammer.

868

You can use it for good purposes,

Cloning has the potential for providing a real service

873
