The Manchester Guardian

deals with the problem of the veto. The paper recalls that the veto was originally intended for the purpose of preventing the U.N. from going to war with one of the Great Powers. Soviet fears have caused Russia to extend the veto to cover all the activities of the Council, except for the most elementary discussions. Even if no veto existed at all, adds the Manchester Guardian, Mr. Molotov would find means of obstructing the Council if he wished to do so. It may be that, in the end, we shall have to make our plans without Russia. That would be a great danger, and a great tragedy.
