

# Morton's Area 51 Tours

In Morton's "Delphi Association Newsletter," June 1, 1993, our hero answers letters to the editor, including the following. Numbers in brackets refer to our notes below.

Morton replies...

Ahh! Area 51! My home away from home! The article Richard mentions was written by Carole Mischola, and it was picked up nationally and ran just about everywhere [2]. It relates the exploits of a small intrepid band of adventurers that brave the cold and the unknown to trek out with me to THE top secret military base. Located 135 miles north of Las Vegas [3], AREA 51 is the testing ground for the most advanced weapons and aircraft in the military's possession.... including flying saucers.

In 1990, I interviewed a scientist names Bob Lazar [4] who claimed to have worked at this facility [5] and that the USA had nine Alien UFO's that we had either recovered or gotten in some kind of deal with a number of ET races.
