>Of course, all of the following represents nothing more than
>the >rankest speculation, but I think these are some of the
>alternatives:

As do my comments.... which are strictly opinions based on the
moon's waxing gibbeous phase, only!

>1) UFOs do not communicate with each other or with any bases.
>Either there is a strict rule to preclude such communication or
>there is no need for them to communicate (perhaps because they
>are strictly independent).

Doubtfull, as it is necessary to coordinate the various
activities of the various craft such as, abduction, fly by
shootings, attempts at psyching out the military, SR 765/F99/G2
pursuit, salute and strategic aircraft chaser needling.... these
guys like to kid around you know!

>2) UFOs use small UFOs (such as BOL (Balls of Light)) to
>communicate, much like carrier pigeons.

Uh, how does a carrier pidgeon communicate. I for one, having
had a number of experiences, never heard any pidgeon sounds...
or even anything remotely resembling a "coo-ing" sound! I have
heard beeping sounds, but not one coo...

>3) UFOs use analog radio of low strength, transmit infrequently,
>and rely on specific frequency schedules and burst transmissions
>to avoid detection.

Everyone knows that UFOs use digital transmission. It is more modern than analog. And EBE's are ultra modern guys. You don't gotta have a PhD to see that.

>4) UFOs use digital radio of low strength and transmit digital
>packets. Such packets are unlikely to be easily detected, and
>since they are emitted from a very high speed airborne source,
>they are typically eliminated by ELINT (Electronic Intelligence)
>systems as spurious, especially since to an unknowing observer,
>their content makes them appear to be noise. Such packets could
>contain encrypted linguistic content, video content of unknown
>aspect ratio, or some other more exotic form of communication.

Repeating... digital, but not necessarily radio... and packets are not likely being used. I have never seen one packet in any of my experiences... uh, needles, body fluid extracting gizmooids, metal like probes stuck up my nose, and sometimes, peepee tools designed to ... uh ... get it on, eh? >5) UFOs use lasers for point to point communications and do not
>broadcast at all. Interception would require the interposition
>of a receiver in the signal path, and the chances of this are
>small.

Lasers? Aimed at what and how are they aimed? Not likely in my opinion anyway. How does the one UFO know where to aim the laser with which to modulate the beam... and then what method of modulation is used? AM, FM, FSK, CW? See what I mean? This is getting freaky, eh?

>6) UFOs use an exotic communications medium such as gravity or
>quantum particles, or exploit some unknown principle of quantum
>simultaneity to transmit information.

Probably very likely. If not gravity or quantum particles, something just as exotic.

>We know that UFOs emit radio signals, and that these signals are
>sometimes noisy and sometimes actually have a form which is
>similar to that of earthly transmissions. I refer you to the
>article in Clark's UFO Encyclopedia, written by Sparks, on the
>RB47 case for an example of this. For most detection of radio
>frequency signals from UFOs, observers report that detection as
>interference with existing radio equipment or as static. This
>would suggest such radio emissions are broad in their frequency
>profile. However, such observations also usually suggest a
>limited range. Some researchers tend to interpret the
>interference / noise output as emissions which are a side-effect
>of the generation of luminosity by the UFO - a phenomenon which
>suggests such mechanisms as X-ray or UV excitation of the
>atmosphere, or the injection of electrons into the near surface
>area of the UFO. Obviously, such mechanisms would tend to
>suppress many frequencies of radio transmission and would tend
>to devalue the use of radio frequencies for communication.

I have been a ham for... uh, 41 years. I have often been quite bored while waiting to be probed on one of those flying saucers. I have thought to myself, "Gee, wouldn't it be nice to have a portable ham radio rig on this thing while I waited to be milked for my body's juices?"

Maybe that's what that QRM (interference/noise) is... just some ham who managed to smuggle a DX-40 and an ARC 5 on board during one of his abductions, eh?

>We also know that UFOs emit light rays, and sometimes these
>connect one object to another. We also know that UFOs sometimes
>use their external lighting for communication with witnesses,
>and may appear to be using it for communication with another

>object.

>Some of the methods suggested above would remain undetectable by
>current technologies, some would require a concerted effort by
>an ELINT organization such as the NSA, and some have already
>been reported. What to make out of all of this is uncertain.

>If you are interested in cases of radio interference / signals,
>I refer you to the on-line Project 1947 EM Effects catalog:

Actually, I have a better suggestion. Get yourself a ham radio
rig and tune in on the 80 meter band, CW portion during the peak
sunspot cycle. And try to sort out even ONE signal from the
racket... packet, whatever... go ahead, just try!
