>>Has anyone pursued the possibility that crop circles are drawn

>on >>_our_ (made by humans) satellites... and even if there
>were >>they wouldn't be able to penetrate the atmosphere with
>any power >>source that would be available in the near future
>(charged >>particle beams are "eaten up" by the atmosphere)

>Thanks, Bruce, for explaining the absorption of charged
>particles by our atmosphere. (Shades of aurora borealis!) I
>defer to your knowledge.>

>However, my question was re-posted to another forum, and I was
>sent by a non-subscriber an interesting article that was
>published nearly 10 years ago that suggests SDI UV lasers could
>account for the type of effects observed in crop circles. I will
>excerpt just enough of it here to perhaps pique your curiosity:>

>The concepts in this document are based on known and current
>technologies and capabilities as extrapolated by Jerry Decker,
>Cheyenne Turner, Ron Barker, Chuck Henderson, and brought up in
>discussions with various other associates of KeelyNet and Vanguard
>Sciences.>

>"Since the inception of SDI (the Star Wars program), Man has had
>the capability of projecting high-intensity laser beams
>followed immediately by EXTREMELY high electrical charges aimed
>at targets on the planet.

TRUE but only for targets on earth's surface where the monster sized high lower laser and associated particle beam accelerator reside. As I recall, the "distance record" for transmitting a particle beam through the atmosphere is a few meters. GRANTED the beam would go farther in th rarified atmosphere miles up.... but. to reach the ground still requires the beam to go many kilometers through the dense atmosphere. Also, this would require BOTH a particle beam generator and a very high power laser to be on a satellite together. TRUE...this was THOUGHT ABOUT during the SDI program But PAPER IS CHEAP...and the designs were on paper!

>"SDI uses very high-intensity lasers (EXCIMER LASERS) to
>generate and project these beams of UltraViolet light. High-
i>intensity UV light cohered into laser beams IONIZES the air
t>hrough which the beam passes thus creating a conducting path.>
>"How Star Wars works

>The idea is :

>1) to build up a very high electrical charge in the satellite,

I presume this refers to the particle accelerator

>2) target a structure from space using a weak UV laser

Perhaps

>3) increase the amplitude of the UV laser beam until a highly
>ionized path is created from the satellite to the target

Definitely.... VERY HIGH POWER NEEDED (Gigawatts? there are no such lasers in space)

>4) this ionized path acts as an electrical conductor much like
>a wire being thrown from the satellite to the target

Yes, sort of

>5) the electrical energy is then transferred to the laser
>beam path which passes the artificial "lightning" to the target

Yes

>6) as the electrical energy passes into the target, the
>molecules are electrostatically repelled with explosive
>velocities causing the target to explode.>

Rather, the target is heated by the onrushing electrons and, if crops, would likely be burned (imagine getting hit by lightning..... which heats the fluid in trees so rapidly that the steam pressure builds and causes a tree to explode.... and perhaps catch on fire)

SNIP a lot of "wishful thinking"
which reminds me, a LITTLE knowledge is a dangerous\

>"The intriguing thing about the crop circles is that to date,
>ALL sightings PRIOR to the SDI project; NEVER involved
>complex geometries or patterns beyond a circle shape."
